Halsey Boys in Tournament

Three students from Halsey will take part in the fourteenth annual Military tournament at O. A. C. May 29. The tournament each year is the means the military department uses to show the training it offers and the serious purpose the physically fit college men give to their work in the reserve corps.

An air service demonstration, directed by Lieutenant Oakley G. Kelley, America's premier long distance flying ace, will be the outstanding feature of the program. The demonstration, including formation and stunt flying and a parachute drop, will open the tournament program at 1 o'clock, and will be followed by the review of the entire R. O. T. C.

Serle A. Dougherty will enter in the pair jumping and pony express events. These are the most thrilling events put on by the students. Truman Robnett and Fred J. Heinrich will be entered in their unit drills and exhibitions.

Other events scheduled to appear include building and wrecking of a pontoon bridge by the engineer unit; artillery and machine gun contests; infantry and cavalry drills; and feature stunts. The impressive retreat will be the closing event. Every grammar and high school student in the state will be admitted free.
