With the Coopers spur lateral highway opened and surfaced the entire distance to the mile-high base camp this summer, Hood River post, American Legion, is making preparations to entertain a record crowd at the sixth annual Mount Hood legion camp, scheduled for July 3, 4 and 5.

The Silverton Food Products company began its 1926 pack last week with gooseberries. The cannery will far exceed the amount it handled last year and hopes to bring its pack up to \$150,000 before the season closes. The strawberry pack is one of the most important, and this will begin in about two weeks.

During the week ended May 2, 107 mills reporting to the West Coast Lumbermen's association manufactured 106,295,330 feet of lumber, sold 118,945,885 feet and shipped 123,321,817 feet, as against 110,918,194 feet manufactured by 109 mills the previous week, 109,480,099 feet sold and 125,420,003 feet shipped.

The Oregon Canning company's cannery at Newberg started 1926 operations. It is handling strawberries and canning gooseberries. Company officials state that the cannery will pack many times the amount of fruit that it did last year and the plant will operate more nearly to capacity than it has for many years.

From this time on through the summer season, all those going camping in the national forests of Oregon are advised to consult forest supervisors or rangers regarding the need of camp fire permits before starting on trips into the woods, according to District Forester C. M. Granger of the United States forest service office in Portland.
