CONGRESS CHANGES DATE

Adjournment Has Now Been Set for June 30

Washington, D. C.—The date for adjournment of congress has been changed by republican leaders from June 25 to June 30 with varying explanations of the reason.


On the house side it was said additional time would be required for consideration of the second deficiency bill, which will carry funds for beginning work this summer on a number of postoffices and buildings throughout the country.

Senate leaders explained the delay was due to the demand for a senate vote on the controversial rivers and harbors bill. It has been approved by the house and for some days has been the subject of hearings held by the senate commerce committee.

A. Ruric Todd Convicted by Jury.
Kelso, Wash. — A Ruric Todd, ex-mayor of Kelso, was convicted of malicious prosecution by a jury in Cowlitz superior court. The charge was based on Todd's having five former Kelso city officials arrested on conspiracy to embezzle charge, the cases being dismissed when Todd did not appear to prosecute.

Big Back Tax Paid by General Motors.
New York.—General Motors corporation paid the government \$3,500,000 back income and excess profits taxes for war and immediate post-war years, and will pay approximately \$4,000,000 after further computations have been completed by the bureau of internal revenue. Back taxes were due for 1917, 1918 and 1919.

Retail Food Cost Gains During Year.
Washington, D. C.—The retail cost of food to the average family jumped over 6 1/2 per cent since May, 1925, while there has been an increase of over 6 1/2 per cent since May 1925, department of labor announced. A slight drop, amounting to three fourths of 1 per cent, was reported in May.
