RUST QUARANTINE **AFFECTS NORTHWES**

Washington, D. C .- The continued spread of white pine blister rust in those sections of the United States to which that variety of pine is native led Secretary of Agriculture William M. Jardine tentatively to promulgate drastic interstate quarantine regulations acting upon the recommendations of the federal horticultural board. The proposed restrictions will become ef fective September 1, and apply in general to a tier of counties in northwestern Oregon, as well as the entire state of Washington and 13 other states.

The regulations would prohibit interstate movement of five-leafed pines, currant and gooseberry plants from the counties of Clatsop, Columbia, Lincoln, Polk, Tillamook, Washington and Yamhill, in Oregon. They would also bar such movement of European black currant plants in the entire intermountain and Pacific coast region.

Investigation has shown that rust an intermediate state of development on currant or gooseberry bushes, which accounts for their inclusion in the quarantine order.

Origin of Eskimos

Dr. H. Rink, who made a life study of Greenland and its people and is the greatest authority on them, held that most Eskimo weapons and implements are of American origin. He advanced the theory that even though the Eskimos originally may have come from Asia, they developed as a race in the interior of Alaska, whence they finally migrated northward and spread out along the coast of the ice sea. He said that their speech is closely connected with the primitive dialects of America, while their legends and customs resemble, or at least suggest, those of the Indians.




