**Flames Raze Kalama Mill**

## NEARBY VILLAGES DAMAGED

Towns and Hamlets for 15 Miles Show Shell-Fire Traces.  
Dover, N. J.—Towns and hamlets within a radius of 15 miles of what was until Saturday the navy's principal depot, bear the marks of the continued hall of debris and the shock of the detonating stores of powder, T N T, and even more powerful explosives. With the less severely injured under treatment in several hospitals and private homes in the hilly region in and about Lake Denmark, it was difficult to obtain an accurate check-up of those hurt in the successive blasts set off by a bolt of lightning.

Explosions occurring at frequent intervals threw shells a distance of about a mile. This barrage made a war-time inferno of an area of four miles immediately surrounding the depot. Troops who were hurried to the scene stood by, helpless to curb the ceaseless explosions. Scores of civilians in nearby towns were injured but the hegra of hundreds of families from their homes made impossible an accurate estimate.

**No Limits for American Ships**  
New York.—There is no "12-mile limit" preventing seizure beyond that point for American ships, according to a decision of the United States circuit court of appeals. The decision reversed a finding in the United States district court of the district of Connecticut, which had sustained exceptions to a government libel filed against the American rum runner Underwriter. The Underwriter was seized beyond the 12-mile limit, a fact upon which one of the exceptions was based.

## BRIEF GENERAL NEWS

Twenty-two officers, five civilians and one native killed by Cypriote brigands in a surprise attack on a wagon train proceeding from Apollonia to Cyrene.

Authorities in Yokohama are fighting a bubonic plague outbreak which already has caused a number of deaths and which threatens to assume highly serious proportions.

Sixteen officers and guards and 375 miner convicts were locked in the coal mines of the Kansas penitentiary at Lansing, Kan., 730 feet below the surface, after a mutiny among the convicts.

Income taxes collected by the federal government in the state of Oregon during the fiscal year 1925, just closed, amounted to \$6,399,172, or 1384,929 less than the total for the previous year.

Information from Rio Janeiro says Brazil has decided to withdraw her delegation at Geneva, although two years must elapse before her recently announced resignation from the league of nations becomes effective.

Another peaceful coup d'etat was effected in Portugal's capital Friday. The movement was directed by General Carmona, former foreign minister, and other former cabinet members, who formed a new government.

**Radio Stations Assume All Risk**  
Washington, D. C.—Until congress acts, radio communication in the United States will be conducted entirely at the risk of the operating stations, the commerce department announced in interpreting an opinion by the attorney-general. The attorney-general held that in the absence of specific legislation by congress the commerce department was without authority to enforce regulations covering the industry.

**Bobby Jones New Golf Champion**  
Scioto Country Club, Columbus, O.—Bobby Jones, British open champion, won the 1926 national open golf championship. Jones turned in a card of 293 for the 72 holes of play.

**Nine Die in Election Fight**  
Mexico City.—Manuel Espino, socialist congressional candidate, and eight others were killed and 14 injured in a fight over canvassing election returns at Dolores Hidalgo.

## JOHN W. WEEKS PASSES AWAY

Lancaster, N. H.—John W. Weeks, former United States senator and war secretary under Presidents Harding and Coolidge, died here at his summer home, Mount Prospect, at 3 o'clock Monday. Death came from angina pectoris and followed a long fight for health.

Weeks died without recovering consciousness from the coma into which he had lapsed early Sunday morning. Mrs. Weeks, his son, Sinclair, and Mrs. John Washington Davidge, his daughter, were at the bedside when the end came.

Weeks arrived at his summer home here last month, hoping that the change of climate might restore his fast-failing health.

Dr. R. E. Wilder, personal physician, stated that the body would undoubtedly be taken to Washington for funeral services.
