OFFICIALS BELIEVE BANK CRASH ENDED

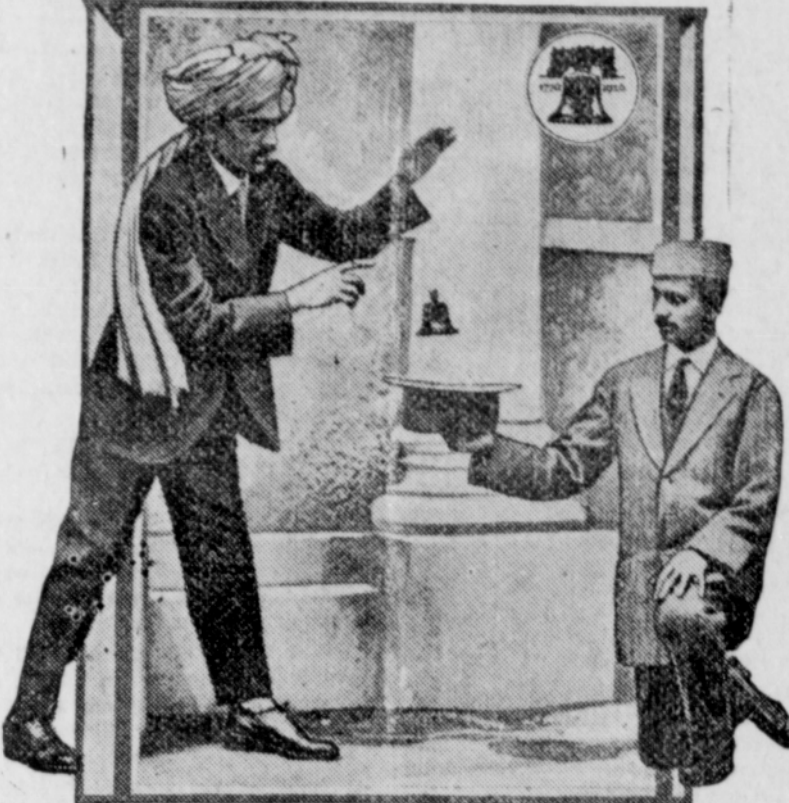
Atlanta, Ga.—The financial horizon in Georgia and Florida appeared brighter here, after a cessation of activities which brought about the closing of more than 120 banks during the past week.

Virtually all the banks closed were members of a chain for which the Bankers Trust company, an Atlanta organization against which bankruptcy proceedings now are pending, served as fiscal agent.

Officers of the two states attributed the closings directly to the bankruptcy proceedings against the Bankers Trust company, and agreed that the influences were "outside the state."

The bankruptcy proceedings were climaxed by the suicide of J. R. Smith, president of the Atlanta Real Estate board and a director of the Bankers Trust company.

BRIEF GENERAL NEWS

Between 80 and 100 persons were killed when a landslide buried a railroad train near Scarajero, Bosnia.

Oakland, Cal., was selected as the 1927 convention city of the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's clubs.

A hot wave and storms sweeping the middle west have cost 11 lives, according to reports received from throughout the country.

Mabel Johnson, 18, and her 14-year-old sister were killed and their parents seriously hurt and one other killed in a tornado which struck a rural district near Ashland, Wis.

Forty-four election judges and clerks who served in the Cook county, Illinois primaries, including five women, were named in indictments returned by a special grand jury investigating election frauds.

Charles S. Whitman, ex-governor of New York, was unanimously elected president of the American Bar association, succeeding Chester I. Long of Wichita, Kan., at the closing session of the convention at Denver, Colo.

A Vienna dispatch to the Westminster Gazette said official confirmation has been received of the report that Prince Carol of Roumania and the Roumanian rulers have been reconciled and that Carol will be reinstated in September as heir to the nation's throne.

Murder Suspect to Be Returned.
Kelso, Wash.—Requisition papers were prepared here for the return to Kelso of John Owen, known here as John W. Smith, charged with first degree murder for the death of Thomas Dorey, Kelso editor, June 19, 1925. Smith was arrested at St. Louis, Mo., and admits his identity, acknowledging that he was in Kelso at the time, but maintaining his innocence of the charge.

Balloonist Drops to Death.
Portland, Or.—Hurling earthward for a distance of 1000 feet before the horrified eyes of 10,000 people, Elwood Francis Stout, 57, better known as Prof. Frank Miller, was killed when the small parachute in which he attempted to finish the second lap of a "double drop" from a balloon at a height of 2900 feet failed to function at Columbia Beach.

MINISTER KILLS TEXAS LUMBERMAN

Fort Worth, Texas.—J. Frank Norris, militant pastor of the First Baptist church of Fort Worth, faces a charge of murder here for the slaying of D. E. Chipps, prominent lumberman, in the office of Norris' newspaper, the Searchlight.

The slaying followed a telephone conversation in which Norris told officers Chipps had threatened his life. Bail for the pastor was set for \$10,000, which was furnished.

Chipps, an employe of the Mississippi Lumber company, was shot three times. One bullet entered above the heart and two others were in vital spots, physicians said. Chipps died on the way to a hospital.

Norris first attracted statewide attention when the church of which he was pastor burned in March, 1911, under mysterious circumstances, which led to his trial on a charge of arson. After a trial in which many startling climaxes developed, Norris was acquitted.

COMMISSION DENIES RAIL RATES BOOST

Western Carriers Held by I. C. C. to Be in Sound Financial Condition.

Washington, D. C.—Declaring that no financial emergency existed in the western district as a whole, the interstate commerce commission denied the application of the railroads in that territory for a blanket increase of 5 per cent in freight rates.

It also denied the petition of security holders of northwestern carriers for an additional 15 per cent horizontal increase in rates in western trunk line territory, and held the earnings of the roads in the west as a whole had not been such as to warrant at this time a general downward revision of rates on farm products, including livestock.

The commission admitted, however, there were many inequalities in the rates structures in certain sections of the west which should be corrected.

Carriers in the west, the commission said, appear to be both "financially and physically sound," although it was added that certain of the important carriers in the northwestern region and in western trunk-line territory were not yielding 5.75 per cent, the figure held by it to be a fair return. It was added, however, that in the entire western district conditions had recently shown an "improving tendency."

ASSASSINS MURDER YOUNG PUBLISHER

Canton, Ohio.—Threats on the life of Don R. Mellett, 36, publisher of the Canton Daily News, because of his activities against alleged gamblers, were carried out here.

Five bullets brought to an end the career of the young publisher, who came here a year ago to publish the News, owned by James M. Cox, publisher of a number of Ohio papers.

Mellett was putting his automobile in the garage in the rear of his home when the assassin's gun spoke. Neighbors who heard the shots immediately dashed for the garage, but Mellett was dead—a bullet through his left temple having ended his life almost instantly. The slayers had disappeared in an automobile which they parked about a block from the Mellett home.

No trace has been found of the gunmen, but they are believed by police to have been hired to put an effective period to Mellett's crusade against the underworld of the city.
