Veteran Iowa Political Leader Passes After Brief Illness.

Des Moines, Ia. — The Iowa state capital, from which the fame of Albert B. Cummins first spread as he headed the state government years ago was the scene Sunday of one of the final public tributes to the man who has been acclaimed Iowa's outstanding contribution to the service of the nation.

With the body of the dead statesman lying in state at the scene of his early triumphs in political life, thousands of his associates and admirers filed through the marble corridors to pay him their last respects and to record the sorrow that has gripped the commonwealth.

Senator Cummins 76, who only a few weeks ago was defeated for re-nomination by Smith W. Brookhart, after serving continually in the senate since 1908, died after a brief illness of heart disease.

GAINES ON TRIAL FOR MURDER OF DAUGHTER

Seattle, Wash.—Charged with the murder of his own daughter, Wallace C. Gaines, 46-year-old veteran of two wars, was placed on trial here Monday in what promises to be the most astonishing hearing ever held in a Seattle courtroom.

The mental and nervous condition of Bob Gaines will be subject to probe and counter during the trial, each side having retained two well-known nerve specialists for expert testimony. The defense insists, however, that no question of Gaines' sanity will be raised, and that the case will be fought on the grounds of his complete innocence.

Sylvia H. Gaines, aged 22, a graduate of Smith college at Northampton, Mass., was slain on the north shore of Green lake, in the center of a well-populated residence district, shortly after 9 o'clock on the night of June 16. She was strangled and her head was crushed with a rock.

BRIEF GENERAL NEWS

Aoram F. Myers of Iowa was given a recess appointment by President Coolidge as a member of the federal trade commission.

Threat of forest fires caused the western entrance to Glacier park to be closed and tourists to pour out of the national playground Sunday.

Two hundred nine lives lost and estimated damage of more than \$10,000,000 to property in a hurricane that raged through Florida, Georgia and the Bahama Islands.

Italy has not the slightest intention of asking for revision of war debt settlement with the United States, even if other nations do, says a declaration made in behalf of the government by Dino Grandi, under-secretary for foreign affairs.

A newly signed commercial treaty between the United States and Panama stipulates that the republic of Panama will co-operate in all possible ways in the protection and defense of the canal and will consider itself in state of war in any war in which the United States is belligerent.

License Fees Increase.
Olympia, Wash.—With receipts from the sale of motor vehicle licenses for July placed at \$117,899, receipts for the eight-month period ending July 31 amounted to \$5,349,915, or \$369,889 in excess of license receipts for the entire year of 1925, it was shown in a report issued by W. G. Potts, state treasurer.

Dry Referendum on California Ballot.
Sacramento, Cal.—The Wright act repeal initiative act, providing for a test of sentiment in California on the wet and dry question, was qualified for a place on the ballot at the final election when petitions were filed with Secretary of State Frank C. Jordan increasing the number of signatures in behalf of the measure to 85,557.

Prominent Aberdeen Lumberman Dies.
Aberdeen, Wash.—William J. Donovan, 44, Grays Harbor lumberman and part owner of the Donovan Lumber company, died at his hotel of pneumonia. He had been ill less than a week. Mr. Donovan was the son of William J. Donovan Sr., founder of the company.

Illicit Brewery Found in Woods.
Seattle, Wash.—Federal prohibition agents reported that they found a large brewery surrounded by bear traps in woods 20 miles northeast of Seattle. E. Evans, a woodcutter of Duvall, Wash., was arrested as a dry law violator.

CHURCH AND STATE IN MEXICO CLASH

Mexico City.—The dramatic struggle between the Roman Catholic church and the Mexican government entered its crucial phase when the new government religious regulations, providing for the enforcement of the constitution of 1917, went into effect August 1st.

Policemen standing guard outside the great Catholic cathedral in Mexico City and the other churches of the country, and the saddened faces of worshippers who streamed throughout the day into the holy edifices to pray, despite the absence of officiating clergymen, were the only outward signs that government's new religious regulations had gone into effect.

Apparently the Catholics were obeying the admonition of the pastoral letter issued by the Mexican episcopacy to remain calm and to continue their religious devotions. It was in accordance with this pastoral letter, signed by the eight archbishops and 29 bishops of Mexico, as a protest against the religious regulations, that the priests withdrew from their churches.

The government's stand is that the church and the state must be kept separated and that the church must stay out of politics. The church's stand is that it is being persecuted by a hostile government which is threatening religious freedom, and that it has not meddled in politics.

The government regulations, in brief, are as follows:
No foreign minister of any religion may function in Mexico; church ownership of property is forbidden, and all such property reverts to the state; religious instruction in schools is forbidden; religious orders, such as convents and monasteries, are forbidden; priests and ministers are forbidden to participate in politics or to hold political meetings; to criticize the government or criticize and oppose the constitution, laws or acts of the government or to incite others to do so; outdoor religious ceremonies and the wearing of priests of their religious robes outside of their churches or residences are forbidden; periodicals of a religious nature are forbidden to comment on the government's acts or to print news concerning the actions of the government.

JUGO-SLAVIA BARES TEETH
War Minister Orders Troops to Invade Country in Pursuit of Comitadj.
London.—The Jugo-Slavian minister of war has given orders for troops to pursue Comitadj onto Bulgarian soil, an act which is tantamount to a declaration of war against Bulgaria, according to a Central News dispatch from Belgrade.

The Belgrade correspondent says following raids by Comitadj, from Bulgaria, on the Jugo-Slavian frontier, a note of protest was sent to Sofia asking Bulgaria to take steps to suppress the Comitadj.

No reply was received and the minister of war then gave orders for Jugo-Slavian troops to take action against the Comitadj, irrespective of frontier lines.

Another Railway Merger Proposed.
Washington, D. C.—Another big railroad consolidation was submitted to the Interstate commerce commission for approval. The New York Central asked for authority to acquire control by lease for 99 years of the Cleveland, Cincinnati, Chicago & St. Louis railroad, known as the Big Four system; the Michigan Central and the Chicago, Kalamazoo & Saginaw railroad. At the same time the Big Four asked to acquire by lease for 99 years the Cincinnati Northern and the Evansville, Indianapolis & Terre Haute railroad.

State Bank Deposits Show Increase.
Olympia, Wash. — Showing an increase of \$15,900,778.70 over a year ago, deposits in the 256 state banks and trust companies of Washington aggregated \$168,613,494 on June 30, 1926, it is shown in a composite statement compiled from reports forwarded to the supervisor of banking in response to the last bank call. Deposits with the financial institutions under state control increased \$2,027,923.86 since April 12, the date of the last call preceding June 30.

Colorado Celebrates 50th Anniversary.
Denver, Colo.—Colorado celebrated its 50th birthday over a three-day period beginning Sunday. Vice-President Charles G. Dawes was the principal speaker Sunday night.

SIX FIRES LAID TO INCENDIARY GANG

Everett, Wash.—Search was started here Monday for men, declared by police to have started six fires in Everett Sunday night, which destroyed property valued at \$300,000 before they were controlled by fire departments of three towns and 1600 sailors. One has been arrested for questioning.

Flames which broke out at 6:30 o'clock destroyed the H. O. Seiffert wood and coal company properties, and sections of a ball park. Loss was estimated at \$25,000.

Fire originating in the Lansdown Lumber company yard at 8 o'clock demolished that property and the adjoining Everett mills works valued at \$250,000 and \$35,000 respectively.

Three other fires were then reported in quick succession in an oil company's warehouse a mile from the first blaze, in a barber shop a few blocks away, and in a market.

The sixth was in a laundry.

DEBT RATIFICATION LIKELY

Poincare's Whole Financial Project Adopted 295 to 188.

Paris. — The debt settlements between France and the United States and between France and Great Britain now appear likely to come up for ratification by the French parliament during the present month before the summer recess. Ever growing opposition of financiers, as reflected by the press, to shelving the Washington and London funding agreements until October, apparently has caused Premier Poincare to recede from his determined and oft-announced position of "no immediate ratification."

The chamber of deputies adopted Premier Poincare's entire financial project by a vote of 295 to 188.

Pastor's Widow Held for Killing.

New Brunswick, N. J.—Mrs. Frances Stevens Hall, widow of the Rev. Edward Hall, pastor of the Protestant Episcopal church of St. John the Evangelist in this city when he was shot and killed with Mrs. Eleanor Mills on the night of September 14, 1922, was arrested in her home in New Brunswick, charged with the murder. Mrs. Hall was released on \$15,000 bail.
