W. L. Wright, the Chevrolet dealer in this territory delivered a new Chevrolet coach to George Maxwell Tuesday.

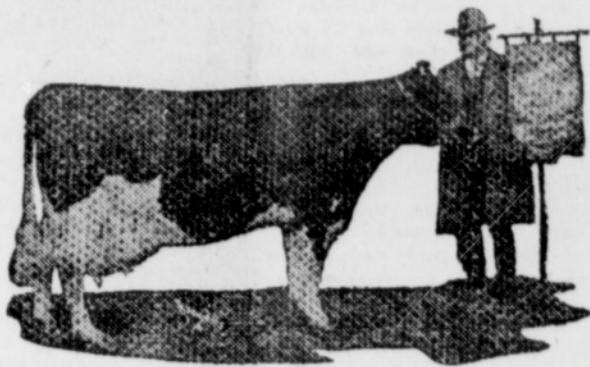
