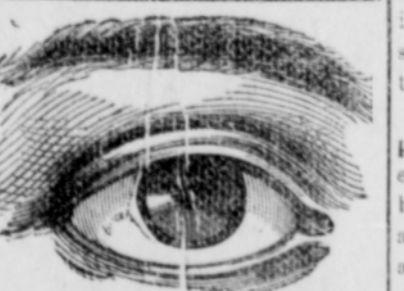

WOOD Superior Circulator



The Wood Superior Circulator is
made like a warm air furnace.
The inside stove is constructed
similar to our well-known Wood
Superior, but has in addition an
outer casing which forms the cir-
culating flues. The body of the
inside stove is made of special
heavy gauge iron and securely fit-
ted to the cast inner closed top and
to the corrugated bottom. The
sectional ventilated, corrugated
linings are extra high and durable.

The Wood Superior Circulator
consists of an inner fire chamber,
surrounded by an ornamental cas-
ing, either Walnut Enamel finish
or Black with Welleville Pol-
ished steel body. This casing is
not in contact with the fire cham-
ber at any point, there being an in-
tervening circulation space from
the bottom to the top of from four
to five inches. The bottom plate
has open fret work permitting the
easy ingress of the colder air near
the floor to the space between the
fire chamber and the casing. Here
it becomes highly heated and is
pushed upward and out through
the fret work top, thus causing a
constant circulation of all the air
in the room or house, quickly re-
sulting in even temperature
throughout.

The Wood Superior Circulator is
provided with a water pan, enam-
eled inside, which is attached to the
back casing and is large enough to
afford a satisfactory degree of moist
air, owing to its large evaporating
surface.

The Wood Superior Circulator is

use of wood.
