MASON HAY CURING

necessary field machinery for cutting and transporting the alfalfa, with dryer, an alfalfa meal grinder and storage house, costs in the neighborhood of \$28,000 to \$30,000.

"To make it successful you should have about 600 acres of alfalfa, as our plan is to cut continuously from the time the first cutting begins until the end of the last cutting in the fall. That means that in the east here we can use the equipment about 150 days a year, as against 10 days for ordinary haymaking machinery.

"We note what you say about the rainfall. Would say that nothing but the heavy storms interferes with our work. We lost none of the leaves, as it's all picked up automatically as it is cut. The saving of these leaves results in an alfalfa which has about one-fourth more protein than the western product.

"While we are pushing the process for alfalfa drying, as that is the most difficult of the forage crops to cure, we have a much greater capacity for oat or barley hay, millet, timothy, cow peas, beans and vetch.

"We can also take care of stover, either shredded or whole, and get a product with good keeping qualities.

Dairying Here Only Begun

The Willamette valley is larger than New Jersey, with a far superior climate for dairying and more top-record Jersey cows than any other state. It could also grow more acres of alfalfa than New Jersey and get more cuttings in a year, but if 500 Willamette valley alfalfa growers could be drawn together by any attraction we should set it down as a miracle.

Some day the paralyzed pocket-books that were not moved by Waldo Anderson's vision of water, light and power from Clear lake, but left him to appeal in vain to the debt-burdened state, may be galvanized. A Mason outfit may operate on 1000 acres of alfalfa. On contiguous spring grain fields rape may be sown with the grain. It would stand, small but well rooted, when the grain was cut, and with the first rains would start growing vigorously.

The Mason outfit would take two or three cuttings of this during the winter, when the alfalfa fields were at rest, and convert it into a rich and palatable meal. Rape will grow every day in winter when not actually frozen.

The Willamette valley could be made the dairy and poultry products paradise of the world, growing all crops it feeds and feeding all crops it grows, practically, and the soil growing richer and richer.
