Our Trip to Salem

(High School Essay)

Grades the seventh and eighth grades and drivers, left the Halsey postoffice about 8:05 Wednesday morning. We had a pleasant drive and arrived in Salem at 9:45 a. m. We first went to the capitol building, where we looked around for a while. We then went into the house of representatives. They have sixty members. The meeting was called to order. It was followed by prayer by the chaplain. Then they went ahead with their regular business. We stayed in there a while and then went out.

We went to the dome. It was so foggy we could not see far. We came back and went to the senate. They have thirty members. When we got there we were late, so we just got to hear them vote. They were voting in both houses. We could hear better in the senate than in the house of representatives, because there was not so much confusion.

When we came out of the senate we met Willard Marks. He made it possible that we might see the governor of Oregon, Mr. I. L. Patterson. We all shook hands

with him. After that we went to dinner at a down-town restaurant.

After dinner we went to the penitentiary; 569 are enrolled. We saw the big dining room. They have a cage that two guards with their guns are locked in during meal time. We also saw the large auditorium. It has seats and a balcony that holds many. They have shows and church there. Several of the boys bought rings that the men in the penitentiary had made.

From the penitentiary we went to the asylum. Over 1000 are enrolled. We went through the long halls and saw many unfortunate people. We went into the kitchen. They had two large tubs of peeled potatoes prepared for supper. They had the largest cook stove I ever saw. Over two thousand are cooked for in this large kitchen.

From the asylum most of us went to the blind school. One car had had a slight accident and had to go home before it got dark because the car's lights were broken. We saw the things the blind children had made, but did not see the children in school because school was out. Among the things that they had made were baskets, chair bottoms, brooms and manual training things. We also saw their books. The man who was taking us through found a girl who had not left the school building. She read for us. She did not read as fast as a person does with eyesight, but she read well. We then left for home. We left about 3:45. We had a fine trip home and arrived at 5. June Layton.
