Clubs That Are Better Than Big Sticks

There are more than half a million fewer people on farms in the United States today than there were a year ago, despite the increase in population. That fact is the best sign in the farmer's horizon. So many more mouths to consume what the remaining farmers produce. If the process continues there will come enough demand to consume the supply, and demand increases prices.

Though Halsey is a rural center, and in one of the leading counties in the state in juvenile school club work, it is only quite recently that the movement here has received the attention to which its importance entitles it. A few years ago a girl from this vicinity took high honors in canning club work, and now the juvenile clubs in tures of twenty drivers in Denver, and around Halsey are receiving due attention and the Parent-Teachers' association is doing good work. To the schoolteachers belongs the principal credit for boosting club work.

The boys' and girls' clubs are resulting in a rising generation fitted to show a larger and constantly growing percentage of these successful ones among the rural population. The corn club, the calf, pig, sheep, goat or poultry club, result in more profitable corn fields, stock farms or poultry plants, and the juvenile club movement, now established and growing throughout the country, will do much "farm problem" which our lawmakers talk about so much with so little practical result.

Juvenile school elubs may do many times as much toward solving farm problems as all the lawmakers in all legislative bodies.

The rapid growth of the boys' and girs' agricultural school clubs promises more food per acre, per animal, per month of growth, per farmer and per dollar of cost in the coming years than in the past. That way lies pros-


