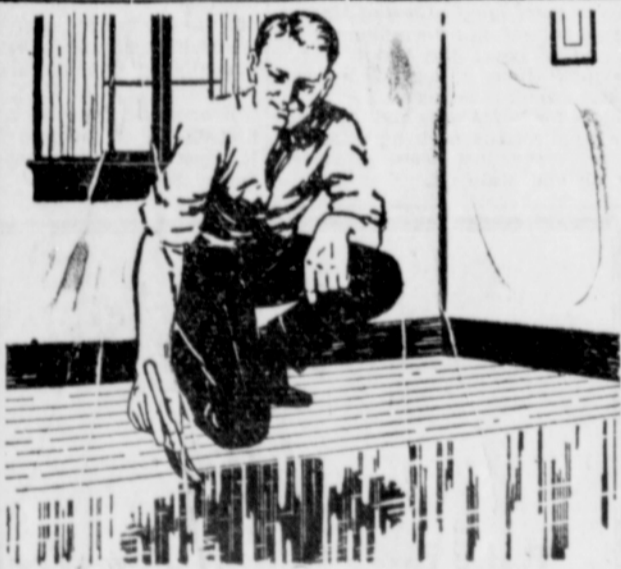

**Sessions of Congress**

The Constitution provided that the congress should assemble March 4, 1789, and thereafter convene "in every year" on the first Monday in December unless they shall by law appoint a different day. Up to and including May 20, 1820, 18 acts were passed naming dates other than December. Since then, with few exceptions, congress has convened in December.
