Flat Grained Woods

Take and Hold Enamel
To enamel well, a wood must take and retain a smooth finish. The enamel cannot remain flat unless the grain of the wood remains flat. If the grain "raises" (shows a corrugated, or wavy surface) the enamel covering must follow the pressure of the wood beneath, and "raise" with the wood. Obviously, the beauty of the enamel finish will be marred. Any wood can be planed, sand papered and rubbed—until it presents a smooth surface for enameling. When first enameled it looks perfect. But there are inherent qualities in all woods that cause them to respond to time and atmospheric changes. When wood grain raises, the enamel finish becomes "wavy" and eventually cracks. When wood swells too much enamel cracks. Enamel is brittle; it does not bend.
