Mrs. W. D. McLaren and Mrs. E. E. Hoyer attended the all day meeting of the missionary society at the Peoria church Thursday.

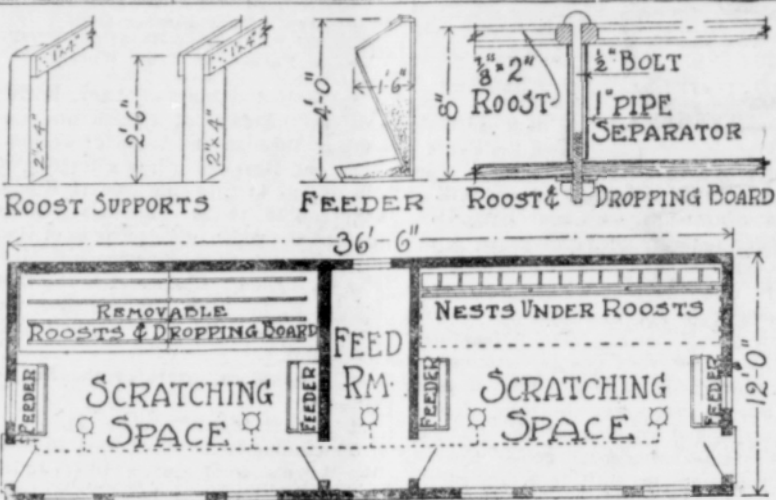
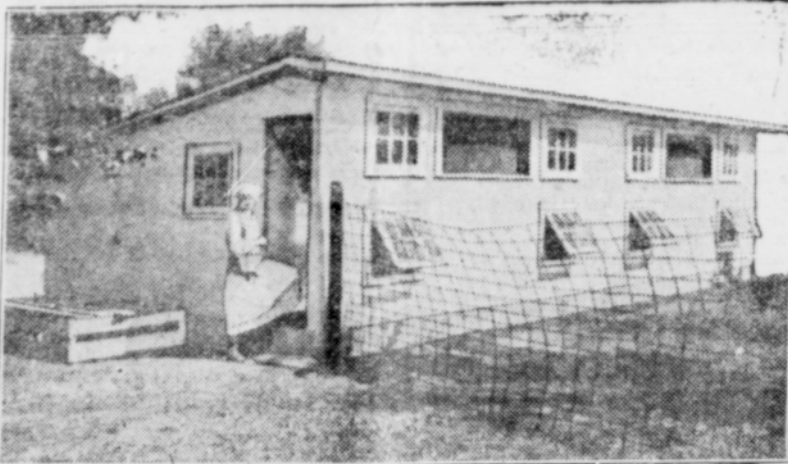
A. L. Knighten came home from Albany Wednesday, the county bridge crew with which he was working having finished their work for the year.

Shed-Roof Type of Poultry House Simple, Inexpensive and Practical

The shed-roof type of poultry house, shown in the accompanying illustration, is simple to build and is not expensive. Faced to the south so that it will get the benefit of winter suns, it provides a house where the layers will keep up to their best production.

The house shown is 36 feet 6 inches by 12. It is divided into two pens, with a feed room in the center. The floor plans show the interior arrangement of the house, while construction details of the nests, feeders and roosts

also are included in the architect's drawings.

It will be noted that the plans specify electric lights, two lamps in each of the pens. In a well-constructed, warm and ventilated house such as this, electric lights will provide a longer working day for the hens in late fall and winter and keep up egg production when prices are highest.

The house is set on a concrete foundation, which also provides a concrete floor. Such a floor is easy to keep clean and when covered with deep litter and sand and gravel makes an excellent scratching place. The nests are at the back where there are no windows, to admit light, with the roosts above them. When the lights are turned on before daylight and in the early evening of the short days the hens have longer hours for feeding and exercise, which are the essentials aside from proper feed for maximum egg production.
