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Something practical, equitable and helpful in the way of farm relief is now in prospect, several forces not heretofore in harmony having come pretty close together in recent reports and recommendations. The latest expression on the subject comes from the "Businessmen's Commission on Agriculture" whose chairman is Charles Nagel of St. Louis, who was secretary of agriculture in President Taft's cabinet, and the significant fact is that all the differing factions have received Mr. Nagel's recommendations favorably. This plan provides for a federal farm board, as in other plans, and that this board shall be authorized to buy stock in the "equalization corporation" and be represented in that corporation by directors, the intention being to buy and hold surplus products when the markets are depressed and to dispose of them when stability is restored. Losses from these transactions must be absorbed from the public treasury. Senator McNary, Secretary Jardine, the advocates of the national grange plan, and the adherents of President Coolidge, have assumed an attitude since the submission of this report which indicates a compromise measure by congress this winter that will relieve agriculture and be satisfactory to the farmers, who are only asking an equal chance for prosperous existence.

Columbia county has established a reputation for raising fine potatoes and one commission firm has signified a desire to take all the marketable spuds for sale in the county. This result has been attained by a system of grading the product that has been fostered and perfected by A. L. Morris, who is inspector for that district, and who has the hearty cooperation now of growers and merchants all over the county. Intelligent inspection and grading pays.

Forty-two new farm families with new capital of \$127,500 were reported as a result of the land settlement work of the Portland and state chambers of commerce for October.
