With a presidential election less than a year off it becomes more and more important that the voting public understand the basic ideals and principals that have made America's great prosperity and world leadership.

There will be the usual number of arguments advanced by vote-seeking politicians and radicals. Government-ownership and free trade advocates will have their say. Framers of harmful and foolish bills will attempt to gain a following for their vague theories.

It is the duty of every citizen to investigate and support measures that will insure a continuation of our business and industry. We are on the eve of a greater age than the world has ever seen. Great projects are being executed. The next president will have to consider such ever growing problems as the tariff, and taxation—both corporation and personal. He will have to stand as a rock against public ownership of industry if our rights are to be preserved. It is no time for doubtful experiments.

Fortunately, the American people can usually be counted upon to support principles that have been cast overwhelmingly in favor of conservative but progressive government.

The health of every community in Oregon depends to a great extent upon the public health work that is being carried out in every other community of the state. No community is isolated. This is especially true with regard to tuberculosis because of the nature of the disease. The program for the control of this disease must be state-wide and constant. The stimulation of local leadership is one of the things accomplished by the Oregon Tuberculosis association and its affiliated county health

authorities, in cooperation with the official health agencies of the counties and the state.

The city of Salem entertained for two days last week the members of the Western Nut Growers association, assembled in annual session for the discussion of the various problems affecting the industry of growing and marketing walnuts, filberts, chestnuts, etc.

About 75 growers of western Oregon and southwest Washington participated and it was evident from the papers which were read and the discussions thereon that nut growing is looked upon as an agricultural enterprise of great promise and consequent importance in this part of the northwest.

Restriction of emigration has reversed the tide of unskilled labor flowing to this country from Europe. A survey just completed by the national industrial conference board shows a net gain of common labor of 260,000 a year from 1910 to 1914. Since 1924 the United States has been sending back to European countries an average of 70,000 a year more than the number landed here.

Senator McNary has slightly modified his farm relief bill and introduced it again for congressional action. The equalization fee is now made to apply to all products of the farm.
