

WE WERE taught very distinct noral lessons in the old reader which we used in the public school when I was learning to read, and especially were these lessons empha sized without subtlety or suggestive ness in the texts which were given us that I cannot at this moment recal any one of them suggests that they did dld not eat themselves into my mem ory very deeply. There was one story however, which I still recall with some distinctness. Possibly it was the illus tration which accompanied it which left its impress upon me. The cleverer of the two discovered that by pushing the basket nearer to his companion be lightened his own load. It was a laboratory experiment in physics and in fall dealing.
