A check of the records of the Feder .l bankrupty courts in Los Acgeles has just disclosed that 92 per cent of all the firms which failed last year were non-advertisers. The everage for 32 cities covered by a survey was 83 per cent of failures occurred among concerns which did not advertise. In Troy, N. Y., not a single advertising firm failed. There is a significant hint in these figures for the business man who is wise enough to profit by it.

Liquor had flowed freely and some of the inexperienced in these matters-women as well as men-had had more than was consonant with an upright carriage. The vulgarity of it was all excused, however, on the ground that he guests were "our best people."
