**DOG OWNERS NOTICE.** Licenses are now due on dogs in Linn County and have been due ever since January 1st and will become delinquent on and after March 2nd. The license fees are \$1.00 for male and spayed female dogs and \$2.00 on female dogs not spayed if paid on or before March 1st, and double the above amounts after the 1st day of March.

During previous years the Court has encountered difficulty in securing persons to collect delinquent dog license but to date five applications are on file for this job, so the county will be amply equipped for delinquent dog tax collectors and will proceed with the enforcement of the law and the collection of these delinquent licenses immediately after the first day of March, 1928.
