EGG A DAY MORE THAN HENS LAY

That a hen crosses the road for reasons of her own, and lays an egg a day, is all the information about her possessed by some members of the public. As a matter of fact, there is no record of a hen laying an egg a day for a full year. The standard as laid down by the poultry department of Ohio State university is 160 eggs in 365 days. The state average is about 70 eggs. Of course some high-grade hens do better. More than one hen of the records of the Ohio Poultry Improvement association has beaten the 300-egg mark in 365 days. But they are not common hens.

Egg production for the average hen is at the lowest point in November, when five eggs for the month is the standard requirement. This standard rises month by month to 21 eggs in April, then falls again.

This information is included on the Ohio State Poultry Calendar, distribated through the agricultural agents by the Ohio State university, to more than 3,000 Ohio poultry growers, who have registered with their agricultural agents and agreed to keep an accurate record of the performance of their flocks for 365 days. The calendar contains seasonal information on housing, feeding, breeding and diseases, prepared by the university poultry department.

### Floor Space Necessary for Different Breeds

The light breeds such as Leghorns, Anconas, Minorcas and others, should have three and one-half square feet of floor space per bird, while heavy breeds such as Plymouth Rocks, Rhode Island Reds, Wyandottes, Orpingtons and similar breeds should have at least four square feet per bird. If the present house is not large enough to provide this amount of space for the flock to be housed it Is advisable to build more room, because a lack of space will make it increasingly difficult to keep the house sanitary and will lower the vitality of the birds, thus reducing the number and hatchability of the eggs pro-

### Wire Mesh Bottoms for

Nests Discourage Mites Many poultrymen are now building nests in their laying houses with a fine wire mesh for the bottom instead of the usual board nests. There are two principal advantages which are set forth for this practice. The first Is that such nests will be freer of mites on account of the fine dust from the straw or other litter dropping through, and the second is that there

will be fewer broken eggs. Nests which are constructed on this plan may be easily sprayed for mites, which is an advantage in their favor. when the straw gets low in the nests eggs will not be so easily broken as they would in board nests.

### Hereditary Traits

Roosters furnish at least half of hereditary influences that determine the quality of chicks produced, and as relatively few males are required, the poultryman can afford to use considerable care in selecting the breeding males used in his different flocks. The Ideal situation would be to have all flecks headed by males that combined good size, color and vitality with a pedigree of at least 200 eggs on the dam's side.

### Poultry Notes

Poultry keepers who use cod liver oil for their flocks should feed it from the time the birds are put into winter quarters.

The poultry men are awakening to a short-sighted policy similar to that which has prevailed in the dairy industry. They have been breeding for production and forgetting form.

Hens that molt late can never be coaxed to lay winter eggs and it is better to put them in separate coops and feed for vitality and future profit. Corn, buckwheat, and mash are all excellent.

Because proper sanitation about the poultry yards will keep down coccidiosis and prevent the problem of controlling it from becoming acute, the disease is regarded with less alarm than a few years ago.

One of the most important essentials of a poultry house is that it be dry, free from drafts and well supplied with fresh air

Poorly colored birds and those with disqualifications, such as side sprigs on the comb and stubs on the legs, are undesirable as breeders.

Keep the pullets and early molters by themselves and give them the tonics, the green food and shells, starch, charcoal, etc., to stimulate egg profuction.



### KEEP WATCH ON SPRING PASTURE

"Caution must be used in turning dairy cows on pasture in spring," advises E. J. Perry, dairy specialist at the New Jersey State College of Agriculture. "In the first place, unless certain precautions are taken, the milk flow may be cut down, and in second place, the pastures may

"In changing heavy milking cows from dry winter feeding to pasture or green feed, it is safest to go slowly. The young grass is largely water, with only about 10 per cent dry matter, and it is very difficult for high producers to eat enough to supply the nutrients that will make it possible for them to produce their maximum amount of milk. Therefore, it is best to continue feeding some grain in addition to the pasture.

"Furthermore, a cause of pastures becoming thin and weedy is the turning loose of the cows too early in the spring. Plant growth is always affected by conditions existing above as well as below the ground. A stalk of grass must have a fairly large leaf area in order to grow rapidly. Too close grazing in the fall likewise retards spring pastures by holding back the root growth. After a year or two the sod becomes thin and patchy, and weeds crowd out the

"Every dairyman is glad to turn his cows out in spring because much labor and feed expense connected with winter feeding is eliminated. The cheapest milk is made the first two months on pasture. But unless the grass is permitted to get a good start, it is likely to 'run out' before the end of the second month."

### Selection of Sire to

Head the Dairy Herd The selection of a sire to go with a good herd calls for the exercise of

a good deal of judgment and the better the herd the more there is depending upon a right choice. All that we know of heredity tells us that he should be pure bred. It also says that he should come from as many generations as possible of animals having the quality wanted. If we want production then we must know where the production is. In other words, we need records.

To make cow testing or dairy herd improvement association records of more use in the selection of sires, a modification was devised and put into operation under the name of Herd Improvement Record. This plan has now been in operation over two years and has met with a very favorable reception. It applies to pure-bred and mixed herds of pure breds and grades, giving more permanence to the records than in ordinary association work. It encourages culling, which its to voluntary "selective registration," and supplies the quickest way yet devised for finding out the value of a bull.

### Rinsing Milk Utensils

With Boiling Hot Water

Rinsing of all milk utensils with hot water-water as near the boiling point as possible—after they have been thoroughly washed, is of prime importance. Neglect of this causes more trouble in the handling of milk than any other single factor. Barn conditions have very little effect upon the bacteria content of milk. course the barn should be reasonably clean; so should also the body of the cow and the hands of the milker, but these precautions are of slight value if the utensils in which the milk is BO+O+O+O+O+O+O+O+O handled are not properly cared for. pail into another should be avoided, because this cools the water too much to make the rinsing effective.

Records of both the dams and daughters furnished by cow test assoclations show that good bulls are needed if the average production of our dairy cows is to be increased.
