## LIBRARY MAKES ANNUAL REPORT TO THE STATE

## Institution Thriving; New Books Are Being Added

During the fiscal year ending December 31, 1927, the Halsey Public library showed an increase of 24 volumes for the year with none withdrawn. The total number of books now owned is 1460. There were 120 volumes borrowed from the state library.

The total circulation was 1460, an increase of 24 over the previous year. The largest daily circulation was 35 and the smallest 17, making an average of 35.

The library is open Friday afternoon of each week from 2:30 to 4:30 o'clock.

\$14.95 was taken in from fines. \$50 was received as a gift from the city and 70 cents was realized from the pay shelf, making the total receipts for the year \$75 65.

The expenditures for the year were \$45,13 for books, rent \$60. insurance \$15.75, freight \$2, 11brarian \$26. Total \$90 48. Un expended balance carried forward


