LIBRARY MAKES ANNUAL REPORT TO THE STATE

Institution Thriving; New Books Are Being Added

During the fiscal year ending December 31, 1927, the Halsey Public library showed an increase of 24 volumes for the year with none withdrawn. The total number of books now owned is 1460. There were 120 volumes borrowed from the state library.

The total circulation was 1460, an increase of 24 over the previous year. The largest daily circulation was 35 and the smallest 17, making an average of 35.

The library is open Friday afternoon of each week from 2:30 to 4:30 o'clock.

\$14.95 was taken in from fines, \$50 was received as a gift from the city and 70 cents was realized from the pay shelf, making the total receipts for the year \$75.65.

The expenditures for the year were \$45.13 for books, rent \$60, insurance \$15.75, freight \$2, librarian \$26. Total \$90.48. Unexpended balance carried forward \$89.88.

Addie Moody is president of the board, Alma S. Hamer, secretary, and Mrs. Laubner, Mrs. McMalin and Mrs. Muller board members. Myrtle Norton is librarian.

SCHOOL BOARD ELECTS TEACHERS FOR NEXT YEAR

Present Staff Re-elected to Guide Young Minds in Education

At the recent meeting of the school board the teachers were elected for the 1928-29 term. Only one change was made, that of the seventh and eighth grade room now taught by Mrs. Lenora Kizer. Miss Mona Bon, now teaching at Jerome, Arizona, was elected to teach these grades. Mrs. Kizer has taught in the Halsey schools since 1925.

L. W. Patton who was selected to the office of superintendent has held that position since 1925, as has Mrs. Nora Coleman, who will again have charge of the fourth, fifth and sixth grades. Mrs. Mirnie Cross who has taught here since 1916 was elected to teach the same grades, the first, second and third grades, and it undoubtedly would have been difficult for the board to have found any one better suited to teach these three grades.

Miss Gladys McCornack and Miss Adah Nelson will again teach in the high school, making their second year here.

P. J. Forster, who since 1920 has looked after the school property in the capacity of janitor will continue to do so for another year.
