The mohair division of the wool and mohair growers of Lane county are to meet in Eugene March 20.

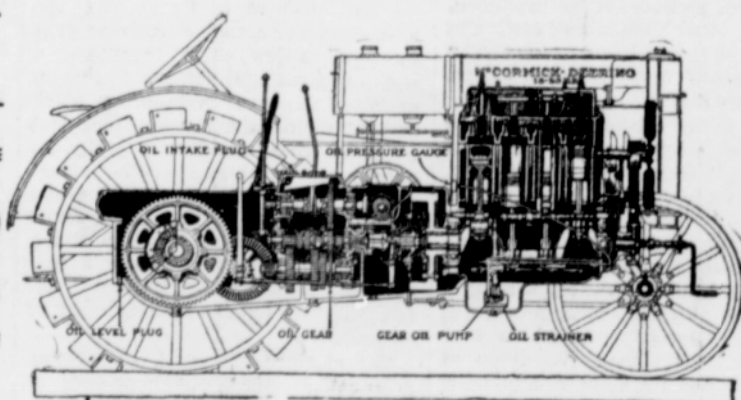
Fond guilty of disorderly conduct by a Philadelphia court, Mrs. Caroline Day called the judge "a disreputable villain" and he doubled her sentence.

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
