College Man Attacks Bills

Four bills which if they should become laws would seriously affect northwest farmers are in danger of passage by congress, warns G. R. Hyslop, chief in farm crops at O. A. C., who has sent protests to the Oregon congressional delegation.

These bills or amendments would repeal the present grain standards act now opposed by Minnesota interests, would place all grain inspection in the hands of the federal government, and would throttle preparation of crop statistics and forecasts now developed to a high degree. Regarding the latter, Professor Hyslop points out that large dealers maintain their own information service and that if the government market information was not available the farmers, country dealers and terminal elevators would be left without authentic market information and would be at the mercy of the large operators.

A Singer's Gift

In memory of her two sons who were killed in the World War, one fighting for Germany and the other for America, Madame Ernestine Schuman-Heink, world famous singer, has given her \$230,000 estate at Grossmont, Cal., to disabled veterans of the war as a rest home.

A native of Austria, Madame Schuman-Heink has spent most of her mature years in America as an operatic and concert singer, and only recently retired. Two years ago she made her reappearance with the Metropolitan Opera Company at the age of 64. She was loyal to America during the war and became an American citizen.

No singer of her time has been more highly esteemed, not only for consummate artistry, but also for her splendid character and charitable disposition, which is so well illustrated by her recent magnificent gift.

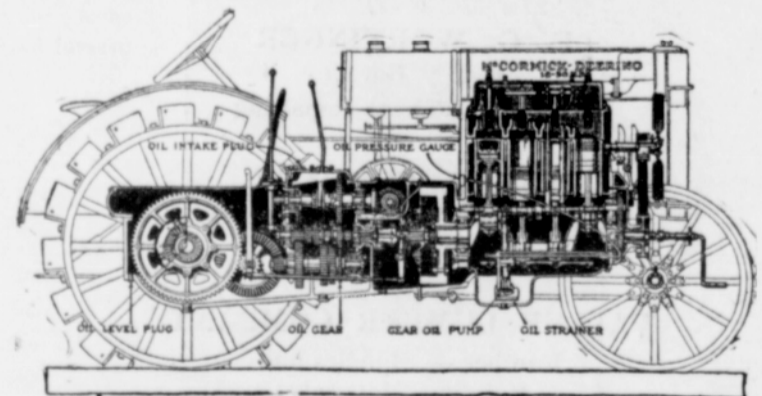
