Complete arrangements for the fifty-ninth annual commencement of O.S.C. June 4 and the preceding program of alumni and graduating class events have been made. Degrees will be granted 522 students, according to the tentative list prepared, at the ceremony Monday morning when Dr. Stephen B. L. Penrose, president of Whitman college will give the address. Linn county has 24 students in the class.

Alumni from all parts of the state and many distant points will return for annual reunions, business meetings and special events arranged. The class of 1887 will hold a golden jubilee and the class of 1923 the silver jubilee reunion. More recent classes having reunions are those of '15, '16, '17, '18.

All day Friday, June 1, alumni are scheduled to arrive. Annual supper is that evening followed by other regular events, Saturday afternoon the cornerstone of the new memorial union building, now nearing completion, will be laid with appropriate ceremony.

The annual military tournament will follow on Bell field after which President and Mrs. W. J. Kerr will give their annual reception and banquet to alumni. Baccalaureate will be Sunday June 3 when Dr. Herbert S. Johnson, prominent Boston minister formerly of Oregon, will preach.

W. L.
