**Peace Plan Progress**

Gratifying results have so far attended the plan to commit the nation to arbitration instead of war through the negotiation of formal treaties having this end in view.

The idea, first advanced by Premier Briand in behalf of such a treaty between France and the United States, was extended by Secretary of State Kellogg's suggestion of a multilateral treaty to include other nations also.

So far 14 nations have approved the plan in principle, including Great Britain, France, Germany, Italy, Japan and others, and it appears that the way is being paved for actual treaty negotiations in the near future.

Briefly stated, the idea of the treaty is that each nation shall agree not to go to war except in actual defense when attacked but will pledge itself to submit all differences which may arise to arbitration by a disinterested tribunal.

For the present at least, this does not mean complete disarmament, but it does mean that the signatory nations would never hastily issue ultimatums or indulge in other warlike gestures until the matter at issue can be calmly considered

and if possible adjusted by peaceful means.

The mere fact that the idea has been received with such unanimous approval by the leading powers is most encouraging. Even such a seasoned statesman and administrator as Lord Reading recently said: "I believe that once this treaty is signed no great war can ever happen again."

Whether this optimism is fully justified or not, any plan whereby the probability of war can be lessened is worthy of the most earnest support by those upon whom the responsibility for future wars must rest.—M. B. Darnall.

**Tribute to Bennett**

Bennett was the pilot of Byrd's plane, the Josephine Ford, on the first aircraft flight over the North Pole. He died a few weeks ago of pneumonia, contracted while trying to relieve the crew of the Bremen, stranded on Greenly Island.

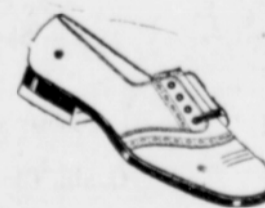
