Amundsen A Distinguished Hero

Of all the heroes who have perish . ed in the Artic and Anartic, Roald Amundsen was the most distingtished, and while the date and manner of his death may never be known, he will be remembered not only as a great explorer, but as one who died in an effort to rescue his fellow-men, one of whom was a former enemy.

Amundsen's record is unique in that he discovered the South Pole and the magnetic pole, and also attained the North Pole. Having accomplished these feats of daring, he retired to his native Norway at the age of 56 to spend the remainder of his life in quiet.

But the plight of Nobile, his companion of the Norge flight across the North Pole, with whom he had had a spirited controversy, roused the dauntless Amundsen, who immediately came from his seclusion to join in the search. While Nobile was rescued by others Amundsen perished. At any event he has not been heard from, and a bit of wreckage from his plane, found weeks later, apparently leaves no doubt as to his tragic fate.




