Indian Chief, World War Hero, Urges Tribes to Vote for Hoover

Calls on Natives to Support Candidate and Running Mate on First Opportunity to Use Franchise.

Chief Buffalo Child Long Lance, author of the recently published book of Americana, "Long Lance," Chief of the Blood Band of Blackfeet; a graduate of the Carlisle Indian School and of the Manlius Military Academy, an athlete of note and a former presidential appointee to West Point, urges the Indians of the country to vote for Hoover and Curtis.

"By act of Congress in 1924 four @ hundred thousand Indians were given the right to vote for the first time in the history of the United States," he says. "Since this bill was passed too late to allow the Indians to ballot in the last Presidential election, the coming election will mark the first historic occasion on which they will be privileged to exercise their enfranchisement. The Indian tribes of the United States have \$1,000,000,000one billion dollars-lying in the treasury at Washington, D. C., much of which is tied up by litigation.

"Hence, of all the people of the United States, it is the American Indian who most needs a friend at Washington. While I am neither Republican nor Democrat-Catholic nor Protestant-I advise the Indians to think, and then vote for Senator Charles Curtis, because if he, born on the Kaw Indian Reservation of Kansas, is not a friend of the Indian, it is safe to assume that we have none. I think it is a coincidence that will become historic, that when the Indian finds himself voting for the first time he finds himself privileged to vote for the first reservation-born Indian to be nominated for Vice-President."

In 1916, before the United States linquished his West Point appointment to go overseas as a private in American Indian.
