Farmers' wives formerly looked upon the poultry flock as merely a means of better providing for the family table, with possibly a little "pin money" from the surplus chickens and eggs. For these purposes it was not thought that any particular care was necessary in the selection of breeds or in the general handling of the flock.

But that idea is fast being discarded and the thrifty farm homemaker now looks upon her poultry as an important source of cash income. She has found that it is little more trouble to have a big flock than it is to have a small one and the big flock is a money maker.

Not only does she have larger flocks nowadays, but she has better stock and employs scientific methods in her poultry raising. More attention is given to proper feeding and sanitation; poor layers are culled out; infertile eggs are produced and they are marketed clean, graded according to size and color.

A good sized flock of pure-bred chickens affords one of the most dependable sources of farm income.

It is interesting to note that no former president of the United States was born west of the Mississippi river, and that more than one half of the 29 presidents were born in two states, Virginia and Ohio.

Of this year's candidates for president and vice president three were born west of the Mississippi, Hoover in Iowa, Curtis in Kansas and Robinson in Arkansas.

Virginia has long been known as "The Mother of Presidents," having given eight to the nation: Washington, Jefferson, Madison, Monroe, W. H. Harrison, Tyler, Taylor and Wilson. Ohio has been the birthplace of seven: Grant, Hayes, Garfield, Benjamin Harrison, McKinley, Taft and Harding.

Only one wife of a president, Mrs. U. S. Grant, was born west of the Mississippi, she having been Julia Dent of Missouri. Seven presidents' wives were born in Ohio, five were born in Virginia, one, Mrs. John Quincy Adams, was born in England. James Buchanan was the only president who never married. Tyler, Fillmore, Benjamin Harrison, Roosevelt and Wilson were each married twice.

The most peculiar fact respecting the marriage of any president concerned Andrew Jackson, who married Mrs. Rachel Robards, erroneously thinking she had been divorced from her former husband.

The divorce was granted afterwards, however, and another ceremony was performed. Mrs. Jackson died a few months before her husband became president.

The lives of our presidents and their wives afford much interesting material for study. The average American might profit by becoming better acquainted with this phase of our national history.

November 11 will mark the tenth anniversary of the signing of the armistice which ended the World war, after ten million lives had been sacrificed and close to 200 billion dollars had been lost by the opposing nations.

The armistice was preceded by the surrender of Bulgaria on September 29, of Turkey on October 31 and of Austria-Hungary on November 3, 1918, leaving Germany the only power opposed to the Allies.

Diplomatic correspondence leading to the armistice was begun on October 6, when the German government appealed to President Wilson for a conclusion of peace on terms previously outlined by him. On November 5 the Germans were notified that the Allies were willing to negotiate an armistice along these lines, but that the details would be dictated by Marshall Foch, commander of all the Allied forces.

The terms of the armistice were delivered to the German representatives on November 8, with a formal demand that they be accepted or rejected within 72 hours. No discussion or modification of the terms laid down was permitted. The Germans accepted the conditions and signed the armistice at 5 a. m. November 11, the cessation of hostilities occurring at 11 a. m., his hour being, oddly enough, the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month.

Considering the deplorable conditions which existed in the world at the close of the war, the recovery of the nations involved, although by no means complete, has been remarkable during the intervening ten years.

Next Monday evening the people of Halsey and vicinity will have

a chance to not only get together and once again celebrate the signing of the armistice but also assist in aiding a worth while project--that of assisting the library fund. A good library is an asset to any town and the Halsey library is good and Halsey people should be proud to be able to boast of having as good one.

The members of the Woman's Study club, to whose efforts the present library is due, are sponsoring a program in keeping with armistice day and in addition will sell candy, pop corn etc., the proceeds to go to the library fund.

We have emerged from another presidential campaign and face four more years of uninterrupted prosperity. The contest just closed brought out some very unnecessary and uncalled for propaganda that might well have been left out of a presidential race, and to us reflected a lack of appreciation of the intelligence of the rural vote of the nation which is the bulwark of stability and so far in history has never contradicted itself.

The city election was somewhat overshadowed by the national free-for-all but resulted in the selection

of a capable corps of officers. just the same.

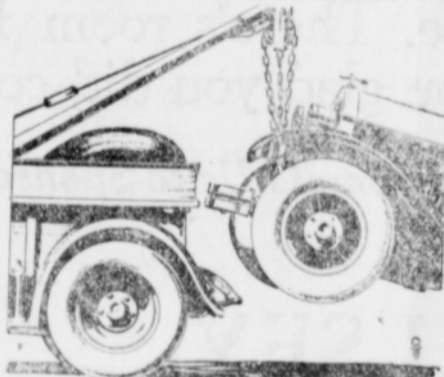

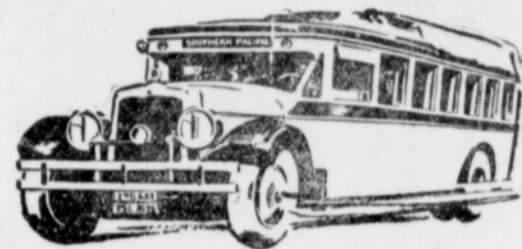

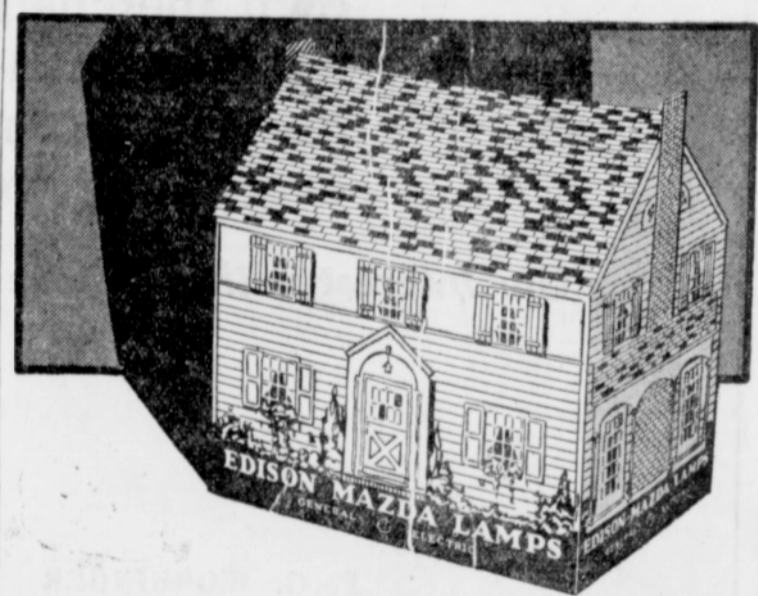
