Washington County Teachers'
Association, in conference assem-
bled, do hereby indorse the fol-
lowing resolutions:

1. That we believe that the
burden of taxation should be
more equitably distributed and
that any tendency on the part
of our people to favor reduction of
taxation at the expense of our
school system would be a detri-
ment to the youth of Oregon.
2. That we recommend the
passage of the Turner-Sterling
Bill by the next congress.
3. That all moving picture
films should be more closely
censored and that we express our
disapproval of all plays which
have a tendency to make light
of the worth while things in
life.

4. That we express our ap-
probation of the work being done
by our County Superintendent,
Mrs. Bryant, in her effort to
consolidate rural schools where-
ever possible and to divide the
county into union high school
districts, in order that every
youth in Washington County may
have an opportunity to attend
high school.

5. That we tender our appre-
ciation for the educational work
which former Superintendent
Barnes has accomplished in
Washington County and that we
hope that he will soon join the
teaching ranks again.
