TIPS FOR TAXPAYERS

If you are single and support in your home one or more relatives, over whom you exercise family control, you are the head of a family and entitled, in your income-tax return for the year 1923, to the same exemptions granted a married person. These are \$2,500 if the net income was \$5,000 or less, and \$2,000 if the net income was more than \$5,000. In addition the head of the family may claim a \$100 credit for each person dependent upon him for chief support if such person is under 18 years of age or incapable of self-support because mentally or physically defective.

For example, a son supports in his home an aged mother and two sisters, 14 and 16 years of age. His net income for 1923 was \$3,000. He is entitled to an exemption of \$2,500 plus a \$100 credit for each dependent, a total of \$3,700. While he pays no tax he must file a return, because his net income was in excess of \$1,000.

An exemption as the head of a family can be claimed by only one member of a household.

Household Dept.

VALUABLE HOUSEHOLD RECIPES AND SUGGESTIONS

Coffee Fruit Cake—One cup butter, one cup brown sugar, one cup molasses, one cup cold strong coffee, four cups flour one egg, one teaspoonful soda, one teaspoonful cinnamon, one-half teaspoonful allspice, a little nutmeg, two teaspoonfuls lemon extract, one-quarter pound citron, two cups currants, and two cups raisins. Bake slowly and set away a week or so before cutting. The quantity of fruit can be varied to suit the occasion.

Spice Cake—One cup of molasses, one cup of sugar, two-thirds cup butter, one cup sour milk, three eggs, one teaspoonful of soda, one teaspoonful nutmeg, one-half teaspoonful cinnamon, one teaspoonful cloves, three cups flour.

Beefsteak Pudding—One-half lb. suet, one and one-half pounds nice steak, two slices thin pork. Make a crust of suet, flour, and water and line the sides of a pie dish. Cut the meat into small pieces, put into the dish, and season with butter, pepper, and salt. Put on a thick top crust, and steam three hours.

Yorkshire Pudding—Make a very thin batter of flour, milk, and a pinch of salt, and about four well beaten eggs. Put in a pan and pour the gravy from roast meat over it, two cupfuls if you have it. Bake in a very hot oven one-half hour.

A Good Pudding—One egg, butter the size of an egg, one cup sugar, one cup sweet milk, and one of raisins, and a pinch of salt. Thicken with two cups flour into which two teaspoonfuls baking powder have been thoroughly mixed. Steam one hour.
