CITY PARK RE-PORT FOR 1924

Many an individual or concern
has visioned the future and
made their plans accordingly.

The pendulum of time steadily
swings, success and failure cross
our efforts in life, home or city,
but most successful effort is
brought by courage, foresight
and ability to solve problems and
not by fine luck. There are too
many of us who are continually
looking at the past, who should
lay their plans for a steady
growth in the future. These few
remarks are the preface of what
our City of Beaverton should
recognize the timely forethought
of buying a city park. That will
be called to your attention by a
vote. Some time ago I was ap-
pointed on a committee to solici-
t a fund for the purchase of a
park, but met with small suc-
cess. We intended to buy a
certain tract of five and one-half
acres at \$3000, street im-
provements paid, \$500.00 yearly
installments. This method did
not meet with the approval of
many, so I then had the ap-
proval of the City Council to
place \$3500 on the ballot. I
was later informed and agreed
that it would conflict with the
Bull Run Water Issue of greater
importance, and I agreed to de-
lay for another time.

While the park proposition
may seem dormant, it is very
much alive and this fact will be
realized in time for the coming
season of tourists, I hope.

For the benefit of some of you
who may not know about this
project, I will say that Beav-
erton is to have a suitable recrea-
tion and auto park with all the
modern improvements for the
tourist, especially, something
they will talk about throughout
their journey. There are many
angles of benefit derived for
Beaverton, so we want to put
this over for 1924. The clock
of time keeps a steady pace, so

we must not lag behind. To
be a Progressive City, all pull
together, for the Highway of
Success, and a Park for Bea-
verton.

TIPS FOR TAXPAYERS

In making out his income-tax
return for the year 1923 the
business man, professional man
and farmer will be required to
use Form 1040, regardless of
whether his net income was or
was not in excess of \$5,000.

The smaller form, 1040A, is
used for reporting net income
of \$5,000 or less derived chiefly
from salary or wages.

All items of gross income
must be reported. In the case
of a storekeeper gross income
usually consists of gross pro-
fits on sales, together with in-
come from other sources. The
return must show the gross
sales, purchases, and cost of
goods sold.

The professional man, lawyer,
doctor, dentist, must include all
fees and other compensation
for professional services. The
farmer must report as gross in-
come the proceeds of sale or
exchange of products raised on
the farm and the profits from
the sale of products purchased
by him and resold. He must
also report gross income from
all other sources.

Taxpayers, in order to take
full advantage of the deductions
to which they are entitled, are
advised to study carefully the
instructions on the forms under
the head "Income from business
or profession."
