**THE BANK; What It Does For
The Individual and the Com-
munity.**
The Bank is a very valuable
institution and a person should
do as much business as possible
with and through it.
There are many ways in which
a bank proves its usefulness:
First; it is a place where you
may put your money without
the fear of losing a cent of it.
On the contrary, if it is placed
in the Savings Department it in-
creases, because every 6 months
a certain amount of interest is
added to the original sum. This
encourages thrift, especially
among young people.
Second, if you place your
money in the Commercial De-
partment it does not draw in-
terest but you are able to pay
your bills by check. This in-
sures safety in two ways: The
check when endorsed and paid is
a receipt for the payment which
has been made. Also, one need
not carry on his person large
sums for which he has no im-
mediate use. It would be impos-
sible to imagine the inconveni-
ence such a condition would
cause. It would also give the
thief and highwayman unlimited
opportunities for robbing the in-
dividual.

Third, the bank is a lender.
It has helped many a farmer
and small business man to get
a start in life and also to tide
him over a short period of de-
pression, and give him a chance
to take advantage of good buys.
Loans made by a bank are ei-
ther "call loans" or "time" loans.
"Call" loans must be repaid on
demand; "time" loans are made
for a definite period. Usually
the borrower gets his loan in
the form of a deposit credit.
