AVAILABLE HOUSEHOLD RECIPES AND SUGGESTIONS

Corn Starch Pastry Cream—One pint of water, 5 ounces of white sugar, 2 ounces of corn starch, two ounces of butter, 5 yolks of eggs, flavoring. Boil the water or milk with the sugar in it. Mix the starch with a little extra water, pour it into the sauce pan and stir up. Then before it has boiled again add the eggs and butter, and stir until the mixture becomes quite thick, perhaps ten minutes. Flavor when cool. This is for filling cakes.

Cream Cakes—One half pound of butter and one pint of water boiled together. While boiling stir in three-fourths of a lb. of flour. Stir till the mixture cleaves from the kettle, then cool it. When cool stir in a teaspoonful of soda, then stir in 10 eggs, 2 at a time, the eggs not being beaten before mixing. Bake in round drop cakes from 20 to 30 minutes. For the cream, boil one pint of milk, stir with it one cup of flour, 2 cups of sugar, 4 eggs, lemon flavoring. When the cakes are cold cut a hole in the side and fill with the cream.

Park Place Lemon Pie—One cup of granulated sugar, one-half cup of flour, juice and rind of two lemons, yolks of 3 eggs, 2 cups of water, 1 large tablespoon melted butter. For a meringue, the whites of 4 eggs to 1 pie, and 1 tablespoon powdered sugar to the white of each egg.

Devonshire Cream—Set a six quart pan of milk in a cool place for 12 hours, then put it over a pot of hot water until the cream rises. The water must boil but not the milk. When it is cold the cream is taken off and eaten on canned fruit or sauce.

Raisin Pie—One cup raisins, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup water, 1 tablespoonful jelly, 1 tablespoon flour. Boil the raisins until soft, then take the water for the pie. Mix all together before putting it into the crust.

Mock Apple Pie—One and one-half cups bread crumbs, rubbed fine, three cups warm water, 2 cups sugar, one and one-half cups vinegar, 1 tablespoon butter, spice to taste.

Baking Powder Pie Crust—1 cup flour, 1 cup butter, one-half cup lard, one-half teaspoonful baking powder. Sift flour with powder; rub in lard and butter and add a cup of cold water.

Electricity has become very popular in the poultry industry. Incubator installations on the lines of companies serving chick- en ranches vary in size from 500 egg capacity to 500,000 to- tal capacity. There is in op- eration in the middle west a hatchery of one million egg capacity.

The cost of brooding chicks electrically varies from \$1.60 to \$1.50 per 100 chicks. This cost is based on 8 weeks in the brood. It has been demonstrated that the steady, adjustable heat provided by electricity is super- ior to any other form of heat- ing.

TIPS FOR TAXPAYERS

In computing his net income for the year 1923 a taxpayer

may deduct from the gross in- come all losses, incurred not only in his business, trade or profession, but "any transaction entered into for profit" not "deductible" or by insurance otherwise.

To be all add, losses not in- curred in trade or business, must conform closely with the word- ing of the statute. For exam- ple, a loss incurred in the sale of a taxpayer's home, which at the time of purchase was bought without intention of resale, is not deductible because it was not a transaction entered into for profit.

Losses sustained in the opera- tion of a farm as a business venture are deductible. If sus- tained in the operation of a farm operated merely for the pleasure or convenience of the taxpayer, such losses are not deductible.
