VALUABLE HOUSEHOLD RECIPES AND SUGGESTIONS

Chocolate Layer Cake—1 cup butter, two cups sugar, one cup milk, five eggs, leaving out the whites of three, four cups sifted flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, or one small teaspoon soda and two of cream of tartar in the flour. Bake in three layers in deep jelly tins. For icing, take whites of three eggs beaten stiff, one and one-half cups of powdered sugar, six tablespoons grated chocolate, two teaspoons vanilla.

White Cake—Whites of fourteen eggs beaten to a stiff froth, into which beat one pound of powdered sugar. Cream four large tablespoons of butter, and mix in with the sugar and eggs. Beat until light, then stir in lightly though well, one qt. flour, two tablespoons of milk, three teaspoons essence of lemon, two teaspoons baking powder. Bake one hour in a moderate oven.

Lemon Cake—One cup of sugar, two tablespoons butter, the whites of three eggs, one-half cup sweet milk, two teaspoons baking powder, one and two-thirds cups flour. Bake in layers and spread between them a filling made thus: White of 1 egg, sugar to make it of the consistency of icing; beat thoroughly and add the grated rind and juice of one lemon. Ice the top with the same.

Raisin Cake—One cup brown sugar, two eggs, one cup very thick sour cream, one teaspoon soda, one-half teaspoonful cinnamon, one-half teaspoonful of cloves, flour to make a stiff

batter, one cup of raisins, seeded and rolled in flour, stirred in just before baking.

Sponge Cake—Beat four eggs very light, yolks and whites together, then beat in two cups white sugar, then one cup of sifted flour, a little at a time, then another cup of flour into which two teaspoons of baking powder have been mixed, lastly a small teaspoon of water almost boiling hot, put in a little at a time. When making this cake for the first time one is almost certain to put in a little more flour, it is so thin. Don't do it or your cake will be spoiled. Flavor with lemon.

Soft Gingerbread—One teaspoon molasses, one cup brown sugar, one cup buttermilk, one egg, a piece of butter the size of an egg, two teaspoonfuls soda, two teaspoonfuls ginger, a pinch of salt, flour enough to make a good batter, not too stiff. Bake in square tins.

Coconut Cake—One cup butter, three cups white sugar, four cups flour, one cup sweet milk, one teaspoonful soda put into the milk, two of cream of tartar in the flour, six eggs beaten light, yolks and whites separately; bake in layers. Make icing and put between the layers and on top, and sprinkle grated coconut on the frosting.

FORD NEWS

The Ford Motor Company entered the new year with a new product, an all steel combination truck body and cab mounted on the standard Ford One Ton chassis to be sold as a complete unit.

The new body is of the open express type, so constructed that it may be readily converted into other body combinations by using stakes, side boards, canopy top, screen sides, etc.

"In fact," says the Ford statement, "the purpose in producing the new body was to place a low cost general utility truck, meeting both agricultural and commercial requirements at the disposal of truck users."

The body is built of steel to withstand the most severe usage and presents a new development in construction. The steel sills are reinforced with wood in order to lessen vibration and road shocks, thus making for

The loading space is seven feet two inches in length by 4 feet in width and of convenient and practical depth. The end is strongly braced and secured by heavy chains which hold it in position when lowered.

FARM REMINDERS

The great loss of stone fruits in Oregon last year due to brown rot prompted the experiment station to publish a circular on the subject. This circular was written by H. P. Bars, station plant pathologist, and includes results and information secured from 5 years of experiment work.

The nature of brown rot and related troubles, natural

conditions, promoting and retarding growth, and the control measures and materials used are the main topics covered. This is the first material put out on brown rot in Oregon for nearly 15 years. The circular is well illustrated. It is distributed free and may be obtained by writing to the college at Corvallis and requesting experiment circular number 53.

GRAY DIGGER TIME

A communication from Ira N. Gabrielsen read as follows:

"The month of February ought to be a month of vigorous activity on the part of all people interested in squirrel control. If poison is mixed and put out where farmers can secure it, considerable early poisoning will result, and it is this early poisoning that shows up later in a most effective manner. A pair of squirrels killed early is worth 8 or 10 later. Let's get them as soon as they appear."

Poisoned grain will be left at the usual stores where those who are interested may secure it. John Nyberg, of Tualatin, was the first man this year to make a purchase of the Government formula poisoned grain for gray diggers. Early poisoning counts.
