TIPS FOR TAXPAYERS

Losses arising from fires, storms, shipwreck, or other casualty—for example, a flood or frost—whether or not connected with the taxpayer's business, may be deducted from gross income in his 1923 income tax return. If his home or automobile is destroyed by fire, the loss is deductible for the year in which it occurred.

Loss of property by theft or burglary is an allowable deduction and need not be incurred in trade or business. A loss by embezzlement is also deductible.

All losses are deductible only to the extent that they are not compensated for by insurance or otherwise.

the matter of furnishing employment opportunities for these men who have successfully overcome vocational handicaps due to war injuries.

Of the total number of trainees completing, 257 are being utilized in trades and industries, 96 along commercial lines, 83 in professions, and 151 in agriculture, according to Mr. Jessep. Special appeal is made to have employers place bookkeepers, accountants, watch repairmen, shoemakers, and auto mechanics, a large percentage of the rehabilitations being in these occupations.

"One hundred and twenty eight ex-service men of this district will complete their training courses during the month of March," said Mr. Jessep. "It is essential that they be provided with suitable employment immediately upon their rehabilitation under the jurisdiction of the Veterans' Bureau. It should be kept in mind that the war disabilities suffered by these men do not hinder them in carrying out their newly chosen occupations. A large percentage of the men have had training on the job. Much interest has been shown in the Bureau's rehabilitation and employment program by employers of this district in the past and further co-operation is looked for in order that the task of restoring these ex-service people to economic usefulness may be properly completed.

Mr. Jessep stated that on January 1, 1924, there were 65,000 ex-service men and women in vocational training in the United States. More than 49,000 others had completed their training courses and many of them are now earning more than they did before the war. President Coolidge, the Governors of a dozen states and numerous national civic organizations have called upon the citizens of this county to join actively in the solution of this employment problem.

Employers in sympathy with actual and complete rehabilitation of World War Veterans should write to the District Office of the Veterans' Bureau at Seattle, it was urged.

ROOT RADISH MAGGOT FLY CAN BE KEPT FROM PLANTS

The radish root maggot fly is controllable by covering the young seedlings to prevent the root maggot fly from laying her eggs on or near them.

A good method is to make an inverted V-shaped trough, covered with cheese cloth or fine wire screen. The trough is usually made 18 inches wide at the base, 18 inches high, and 10 feet long. It can be made from light material and with good care will last several years. The radishes can be either sown in rows or sown broadcast under the screen.

When the radishes are half grown the screen can be removed and another planting made. In this way fresh radishes can be had at all times during the season. Little damage will result from removing the screen from the mature plants as the fly will seldom deposit eggs on any but young plants.

F. F. COMMUTATION

RATES ARE CUT

Reductions of from 20 to 25 per cent in rate on 30-day commutation tickets used between Portland and its suburban territory were made effective recently by the Southern Pacific railway system.

The bus lines do not enter into this competition on commutation rates, according to officials of the company.

Under the reduction the 30-day rate between Beaverton and Portland will be \$6.66 instead of \$8.72; between Sherwood and Portland, \$11.16 instead of the former \$14.96; and between Hillsboro and Portland, \$12.36 instead of \$16.37. Similar reductions are made between other nearby communities and Portland.

S. P. WISHES TO ASSIST SETTLEMENT IN WEST

Important action intended to assist land colonization in western states has been taken by the Southern Pacific Company in taking up with other western carriers associated in the Transcontinental Passenger Association a proposition to place in effect "home-seekers' excursion fares from the Middle West to points in California, Oregon, Nevada, New Mexico and Arizona. Announcement of the company's action was made recently by J. H. Parsons, passenger traffic manager for the company.

Southern Pacific proposed to the other carriers that the home-seekers' fare for the round trip be fixed at the one way fare plus five dollars, the tickets to be sold on the first and third Tuesdays of each month from March to December inclusive for parties of 25 or more traveling together. Fifteen days will be the final return limit.
