SCHOOL BOY LABORERS

Many people have been worrying because of the scarcity of men to do the rough work of the country. It has seemed to them as if it would be necessary to let in a great multitude of aliens in order to get our roads built and our ditches dug.

But there are other sources of labor. About 20 high school boys at Cadillac, Michigan, were employed recently on the paving gangs in that city, and the city manager says they are excellent workers. It was interesting to see the husky youths racing with loaded wheelbarrows for the concrete mixer.

The country has not made all the use it could of the students who are idle through the summer. Many more of them would draw back from the tasks calling for overalls and muscle. They would work with more energy than many of the manual workers you see nowadays.

SERVING THE HOME

FOLKS FIRST

Some men who entertain political ambition are not willing to begin at the bottom rounds of political preferment. They dislike to take a municipal office or serve in the lower branch of a state legislature. They would like to start in higher up.

But people who do begin such a career at the bottom have a great advantage, in the knowledge gained of political life, and in their familiarity with the needs of the people and the best ways to do public business. President Coolidge, for instance, was willing to begin as councilman of his home city, and from there he worked his way up.

It takes something of a man's time and attention to serve in a city government position, but good citizens who are willing to accept such office perform a great service to their townsmen, and fit themselves to go higher if they have the ability and desire for public work.

THE CONSERVATION POLICY

It was one of the greatest achievements of Theodore Roosevelt that he aroused the nation to realize the permanent losses it was suffering through the waste of its natural resources. One reason for the great stir made by the oil lease controversy, has been the feeling that these principles of conservation of resources have not been adhered to in the disposition that has been made of the oil lands.

It has proved true in some periods of our history and in many regions, that the value of resources wasted was greater than the value used. This was particularly true of forest resources.

The natural wealth of a country is the chief base of material prosperity. An industrious people might live in a country devoid of natural resources, but it would be only under great difficulties. If the country is to continue prosperous, its forests, water powers, soils, minerals, oils, etc., must be scientifically handled.

It is the tendency of many men to look only at the immediate profit to be made out of such resources. The man who cuts down woodland in a wasteful way, may think that a dollar in hand now is worth two dollars in timber later on. But as a result of following that policy many years, the American people now find that their timber supply is short and construction costs high.

The United States government and the American people ought to take up the conservation movement again with renewed zeal, to make sure that every natural resource is being carefully used. The oil property belonging to the government is the first matter to come up, and the whole question should be re-examined to shape a policy that will protect the country's oil reserves from wasteful exploitation.

BACKING UP THE SCHOOL

Much of the success of a country school depends on the kind of home support it gets. The country school needs all the enthusiasm it can arouse, and if the children hear the home folks knocking the school and the teacher, those youngsters are not going to feel much interest.

Whatever faults there may be in a school, the parents should never comment upon them in the presence of the children. Have the children feel that the school is the best ever, and they will show twice as much interest to take hold and do their best. If they have that feeling, in nine times out of ten, it will be a good school.

SCHOOL BANDS

The Buxton, North Dakota, school has a band that has acquired a wide reputation. This band, as told in the St. Paul Farmer, has won the state high school music contest for several years, and it makes a tour of neighboring states each summer. It plays the best music, has had as high as 1000 at its paid concerts and has \$16,000 invested in musical instruments and traveling equipment.

Some of the schools of Washington County would do well to see what they could do along this line. Such an organization helps young people acquire self-confidence and ambition for self-improvement. Conditions in the country towns are favorable for such organizations, since the young people are not too much occupied by foolish distractions.

THE FARM HOME

In selling his products, the farmer should consider appearances like anybody else. Many farmers in the past thought it made no difference what kind of a looking place they had. It never occurred to them that it would be beneficial to plant trees and shrubbery about their home or to keep the buildings well painted and disorder removed.

Yet as a result of the disorderly conditions that some maintained, a possible buyer for their products might pass along the road and might get the idea that such a slovenly looking place indicated that the man's business was not being well run.

To-day a vast improvement has been made in the majority of farm homes, though some do not yet realize all the advantage they might gain by giving a better impression.

If a visitor was looking about the country to see where he could buy farm products to best advantage, he would be likely to choose the neighborhood where the farm property was well kept up, rather than one that looked run down.

It may be said that the bulk of farm products are bought by professional buyers who are "hard boiled" fellows, who are not affected by appearances, and who judge a product for just what it is worth without regard to external surroundings.

Yet that principal does not work in selling other kinds of goods. The man who tries to run a store in disorderly looking quarters usually finds that it will pay him to spruce up. So it is likely to prove true that the farmer who makes his place look well commands more respect.

FARM REMINDERS

Trouble in churning at this time of the year may be overcome by raising the temperature of the cream. Cream that is too cold requires a long time to churn. Cream ordinarily should churn in from 30 to 40 minutes and no difficulty will be encountered in doing this if the cream has a temperature of about 60 degrees. For best results it should be held at this temperature for about two hours prior to churning time.

Field peas to be successful must be planted early. February and March seeding is important in the Willamette valley, March and April in the coast region and the high, irrigated districts, and March in the Columbia basin if the maximum yields are to be obtained.

The nature of brown rot and related troubles, natural conditions promoting and retarding growth, and the control measures and materials used are main topics of the circular. This is the first material put out on brown rot in Oregon for nearly 15 years. The circular is well illustrated and like all station circulars it is distributed free to the citizens of Oregon on request.

Gooseberry growers who intend to dispose of their fruit to canneries must spray with lime-sulfur to prevent mildew, but spraying while the fruit is developing will cause "Sulfur coating," which spoils the fruit in the cans. One spray applied as the leaf clusters are beginning to expand and a second as the first flowers bloom will usually stop mildew infestation. Thorough work will protect the berries from attack.

Brown rot is the subject of experiment station circular No. 53 written by H. P. Bares, station plant pathologist. The great loss of stone fruits in Oregon last year prompted the publication of this circular. Results and information secured from 5 years of experiment work are included in it.

Lice and ring worms are likely to cause trouble in stock this time of year, especially in the young. Lice may be handled quite successfully by applying raw linseed oil, rubbing it well into the skin. Ring worms may be treated satisfactorily by applying salicylic ointment or paint lard and sulphur on the parts affected.

VALUABLE HOUSEHOLD RECIPES AND SUGGESTIONS

Try this lunch—a bowl of rice steamed in milk, a dish of fine Oregon stewed prunes, and plenty of cream for both.

Baked Custards will not curdle if they are put in a pan of water to bake. The water should not be allowed to boil.

In making meringues, use 3 tablespoons of sugar to one egg white. Place in a moderate oven that will take it about 15 minutes to brown and you will have a meringue that will keep its shape.

If soft custards curdle, beat with a drier egg beater till smooth.

Oranges are better than milk for the mid-morning lunch. They are high in vitamin content, and do not deaden the appetite as milk does.

Animal crackers dipped in chocolate make a nice surprise for the school lunch box.

Fruit preserves may be made with far less sugar if salt is used. They must be kept a few days before using, so that the salty taste is no longer distinguishable. Allow 1/2 cup of sugar and 1/2 teaspoon salt to each pound of fruit.

Ginger Snaps—Two cups of molasses, one-half cup of sugar, a heaping cup of hard, one tablespoonful of ginger, one-half tablespoonful salt, one and one-half teaspoons of soda, half a cup of warm water. Mix stiff enough to roll out thin.

Baking Powder Doughnuts—To one quart of flour add one teaspoonful of salt, three of baking powder, and then sift. Add one large tablespoonful of lard; rub well into the flour. Wet up with cold water in which put two well-beaten eggs. Mix as soft as can be rolled.

Almond Icing—Blanch half a pint of sweet almonds; when they are thoroughly dry and cold pour a few of them at a time in a mortar until well pulverized and then mix the whites of three eggs with three-quarters of a pound of powdered sugar, add to the almonds, flavor with a teaspoonful of lemon or vanilla.
