A SURE WAY TO GET RID OF RATS

One of the most effective of all rat eradicators is a combination of equal parts of cornmeal and plaster of paris applied in spoonful amounts in the fields and ditches, about the farm buildings, and in and around the burrows themselves. It is superior to poison baits and the safest combination to use on the farm.

GOOD BREATHING

Of all the organs of the body, the lungs and air passages are most frequently attacked by diseases. Colds, bronchitis, and influenza are so common that no one entirely escapes them, while pneumonia and tuberculosis kill thousands of persons annually. Yet everyone can do much to avoid these diseases by taking reasonable care of his breathing organs, and by securing an abundance of fresh air.

In our civilization the art of slow, regular breathing seems to have become almost a lost art. The advantages of deep breathing were appreciated by the early races whose existence depended upon their physical endurance. A certain Oriental deep breathing exercise is used to cultivate mental poise. The first step in the control of the nervous system is deep quiet breathing. Deep breathing calms mental agitation and tends to give the individual confidence. In deep breathing the whole lung is forced into action and the circulation of the blood in the abdomen is maintained more efficiently, thus equalizing the circulation throughout the body.

Breathing is an unconscious act, but much can be done to create habits of using the whole

lung. In ordinary breathing only about ten per cent of the lungs' contents is changed at each breath.

Deep breathing exercises will give value to everyone, but especially to the indoor worker, who will find this a good resource. The habit of taking a dozen deep breaths of fresh air daily will do much to promote efficiency and good health.

Breathing exercises should be slow, regular, deep, and through the nose. Deep breathing must be slow to be beneficial. Three breaths per minute is a good rule. Remember that slow, regular, deep breathing calms while rapid breathing agitates the nervous system.

Take a full breath very slowly through the nose, mouth being closed, hold the breath for a few seconds after which the air is exhaled very slowly and fully through the mouth. The act of inspiration can be strengthened by gradually raising the arms to a horizontal position during in-breathing, and letting them fall again during out-breathing. Correct posture is an essential of good breathing. Stand erect with heels six inches apart and toes directed straight forward. Imagine that you are pushing some resisting object with your chest. Your body will then be in the proper position, that is, your chin will be in, your chest arched forward, your neck perpendicular and well stretched, your arms hanging by their own weight and about the middle line of the hips.

Fresh air and carefully regulated exercise should be kept strictly within bounds, and they should be governed by the advice of the physician. In addition to systematic breathing exercises, walking, hill climbing, swimming, golf and tennis are interesting and will do much to promote good breathing and good health.

BEAVERTON

WATER CODE

ORDINANCE No. 88

An ordinance prescribing the water rates to be charged for water by the Town of Beaverton, Oregon, beginning March 1st, 1924, providing for the collection of said water rates repelling all other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance and declaring an emergency.

THE TOWN OF BEAVERTON DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That in pursuance of the estimate of the Town Engineer of the Town of Beaverton of the probable expense of maintaining and conducting the water system for the Town of Beaverton and the contemplated improvements and extensions in said water system, together with the interest on bonds and payment into the sinking fund as provided by the charter to be paid for out of the income from the sale of water and in accordance with the recommendations of the City Engineer, the following rates are prescribed as the monthly water rates of the Town of Beaverton, said rates to be in full force and effect until further altered or changed by ordinance.

All persons or parties using water within the Town limits of the Town of Beaverton shall pay for said water at the following rate per month:

First 300 cu. ft.	\$2.00
Next 700 cu. ft. at per 100 cu. ft.	.40
Next 4000 cu. ft. at per 100 cu. ft.	.35
Next 15000 cu. ft. at per 100 cu. ft.	.32
All over 20000 cu. ft. at per 100 cu. ft.	.28

All personal users of water outside of the Town of Beaverton shall pay for said water at the following rates per month:

First 300 cu. ft.	\$2.50
Next 700 cu. ft. at per 100 cu. ft.	.50
Next 4000 cu. ft. at per 100 cu. ft.	.45
Next 15000 cu. ft. at per 100 cu. ft.	.35
All over 20000 cu. ft. at per 100 cu. ft.	.30

All outside water districts and consumers using at least 10,000 cu. ft. per month of water shall pay for same at the rate in accordance with the contract as may be hereinafter fixed by the Town Council.

Section 2. It is ordered and ordained that no water shall be furnished to any consumer outside of the Town of Beaverton without said consumer shall first and at the time said water connection is made in said water under the direction of the Town of Beaverton and pay for the same. Said consumer must also pay all reasonable charges to the Town of Beaverton for installing said meter.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful for any person or party to attach or detach from any water main or service pipe or other connection through which water is supplied by the city or to transfer in any manner such pipe or connections without first having obtained the written consent of the Water Clerk in charge of said water system.

Section 4. Every plumber shall make a report to the Water Clerk of all connections, attachments and extensions made by him, within three days after the same have been made, giving the location of the premises, the name of the owner, and the place where said connection was made with the main and pipe of the water system.

Section 5. It shall be unlawful for any person or party to attach or detach from any water main or service pipe or other connection through which water is supplied by the city or to transfer in any manner such pipe or connections without first having obtained the written consent of the Water Clerk in charge of said water system.

Section 6. Whenever any water consumer or person desiring to make connection upon any city water main or pipe, or have the water pipe detached from such water mains, he or she shall notify the Superintendent of the water works or Water Clerk any household or other consumer of water supplied by the Town of Beaverton to keep or permit water to run or be discharged through the pipes or faucets in any house, building, or lot owned or occupied by such household or other consumer of water in excess of the quantity actually necessary for domestic use, and obtain the consent of said Superintendent or Water Clerk and shall, within twenty-four hours, upon payment of the reasonable expenses thereof, proceed to make such attachment or detachment, as the case may be, provided, however, that all water rates and charges against the applicant be fully paid.

The consumer shall attach or detach or make connection upon the water main where designated by the Town of Beaverton and said consumer shall pay for the installing and laying of all necessary water pipes from his own property to the connecting point upon said water main.

Section 7. It shall be unlawful for any person to cut, alter, change, remove, disconnect or connect with, or in any manner transfer, meddle or tamper with any hydrant owned or used by the Town of Beaverton; providing, however, that the provisions of this section shall not apply to the use of water by the Town of Beaverton for fire purposes; and, provided further, that other departments may be allowed to connect on said hydrants, but before doing so must obtain a permit therefor from the Water Clerk or Superintendent of said water system.

Section 8. Applications for water and for the use thereof must be made to the Water Clerk or Water Superintendent in writing signed by the owner, lessee, agent and the applicant must state fully and truly all the purposes for which water may be required and must agree to conform to the ordinances concerning the use of water, as a condition for such use.

Section 9. No person supplied with water from the city water mains will be entitled to use it for any purpose other than stated in his application or to supply in any way other persons.

Section 10. The town shall maintain at least 12 inches inside of the street curb, a flat-headed round-way stop-cock of approved pattern and material and protected by means of a suitable box, provided with a cover which will be furnished by the Town of Beaverton without charge, upon written application of the owner, lessee or agent of the premises who must keep them in repair.

Section 11. No plumber or other person will be allowed to make alterations in any conduit, pipe or other fixture connecting with the city mains, or to connect pipes when they have been disconnected, or to turn water off or on any premises, without permission from the Water Clerk or Water Superintendent.

Section 12. Plumbers failing to perform their work or properly report the same according to the established rules and regulations, or execute their work unskillfully, or to the damage of the Town of Beaverton, may be debarred from making connections with the city mains.

Section 13. The water may at any time be shut off from the mains, with or without notice, for repairs or other necessary purposes, and the Town of Beaverton will not be responsible for any subsequent damages. While water is temporarily shut off from the mains the hot water faucets should be kept open by the occupants of the premises to allow the water to escape from the water heaters and, should damage result to meters by reason of steam or hot water, the owners shall be charged for repairs.

Section 14. The hours for sprinkling purposes may be fixed by the Water Clerk or Water Superintendent from time to time, as the case demands.

Section 15. When any consumer whose water supply is metered shall make a complaint that the bill for any particular month is excessive or is erroneous, the Town of Beaverton will, upon request, have such meter rechecked and the service inspected for leaks. Should such consumer then desire that said meter be tested further, he or she will be required to make a deposit of \$2.00 to cover the cost of making such test. The meter will then be tested. Should such meter show an error of over 5 per cent in favor of the Town of Beaverton, the \$2.00 deposited will be refunded to the consumer, the meter will be changed and the bill adjusted accordingly. If the test of such meter should show an accurate measurement of the water, or should show an error in favor of the consumer, the \$2.00 will be forfeited to the Town of Beaverton to cover the expense of such test.

Section 16. The minimum charge for water used of \$2.00 inside of the Town of Beaverton and the minimum charge of \$2.50 per consumer on the outside of the Town of Beaverton will be due and payable the first of each month in advance. All water used in excess of the minimum 300 cu. ft. will be due and payable according to the meter reading upon the 10th of the following month.

All water bills shall be paid at the Water Clerk's office at Beaverton, Oregon, and unless the same are so paid, the Water Clerk or the Superintendent of the water works may turn off the water from said consumer and refuse to further supply said consumer until said bill is paid in full. In case it becomes necessary to turn off any water from the consumer, a charge of \$1.00 will be made in addition to the amount due for the expense of turning the water off and on.

Section 17. After the water has been shut off at the stop-cock at the curb, provided in this ordinance, if it should be turned on by any person except an employee of the water system, the water may be permanently shut off from said consumer and will not be turned on again until a charge of \$10.00 shall have been paid to the water clerk by said consumer.

Section 18. All charges for furnishing water within the town of Beaverton shall be chargeable to the premises where the water is supplied. Whenever charge for furnishing water to any premises shall not be paid within ten days after the same becomes due and payable, the water clerk or superintendent of the water system in charge may discontinue the service of water to such premises and water shall not again be furnished thereon until all outstanding water obligations for water supplied to such premises shall have been

paid in full.

Section 19. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction, before the Town Recorder, be punished by a fine of not exceeding \$50.00 or less than \$10.00, or by imprisonment in the city jail for a period of not to exceed thirty days, or both by such fine and imprisonment.

Section 20. All other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

WHEREAS, it is necessary that the foregoing ordinance should go into full force and effect immediately upon its passage and adoption by the Council, and, whereas, the peace and health and safety of the citizens of the Town of Beaverton require that the town should be supplied with an adequate and immediate supply of

suitable water at as early a date as possible and in order to do so it is necessary to enact this ordinance; now, therefore,

An emergency is hereby declared to exist and this ordinance shall immediately go into full force and effect upon its adoption and approval.

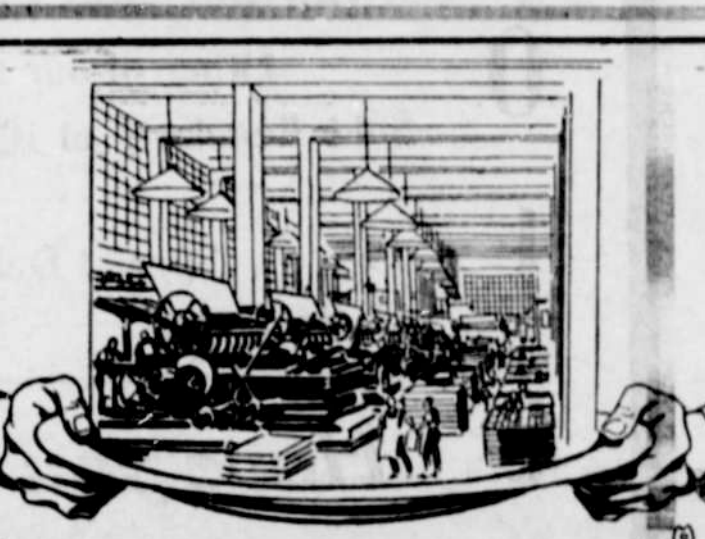
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
