## FARM REMINDERS

**On Pasture Demand Grain**  
With pasture season coming on there is often a desire to discontinue feeding grain to the cows to a great extent if not entirely. Cows well fed during the winter, says N. C. Jamison, college extension dairyman, will milk well for a short time with little change in the amount of milk produced altho the grain ration has been decreased. When the stored surplus of food material has been "milked off" the cows reduce in flesh, especially when they feed on "washy" early pastures. A gradual change from grain to pasture tends to prevent the loss of flesh. After the pastures have become strong less grain is required.

Lettuce acreage in Oregon will probably be smaller this year than last. At least there will be no outstanding increase as has been the case the past few years. Many sections are reporting smaller plantings than last year because prices last year did not come up to expectations.

Skim thick cream to test at least 30 per cent. The thicker the cream the more skim milk you will have left to feed the stock. Skim milk for feeding hogs or chickens is worth one-half as much per hundred lbs. as corn is worth a bushel, so 200 pounds of skim milk has as much feed value as one bushel of corn.

Experiments at the station at Corvallis have shown that hay put into storage in the summer months increased several pounds per bale during the winter and usually reaches its maximum in February or March. It takes up moisture from the moist air and the bales are considerably heavier at mid-winter than they are at mid-summer. The hay generally goes back to nearly its original weight the following summer.

Considerable alfalfa will probably be planted on the river bottom and other warm, well drained soils of Western Oregon this April and May. Planning to secure the seed of the genuine Grimm alfalfa seed be fire stocks are depleted and to anticipate needs for landplaster which usually helps in getting a stand of alfalfa, is recommended.

## Household Dept. VALUABLE HOUSEHOLD RECIPES AND SUGGESTIONS

**English Walnut Cake**—2 cups sugar, one-half cup butter, three fourths cup sweet milk, whites of five eggs, three cups flour, three teaspoonfuls baking powder. Shell one pound of English walnuts; reserve one dozen whole meats, chop the remainder fine and add to the cake, also one cup of raisins seeded and chopped fine. Bake and ice the cake. Before the icing hardens mark it off into squares and put half a walnut meat in the center of each square.

**Coffee Cake**—One cup coffee one cup sugar, one cup molasses, one cup butter, one and one-half cups raisins, one or two ounces citron, one level teaspoon soda, four cups flour, one tablespoonful each of cloves, allspice, and cinnamon. Bake an hour in moderate oven.

**Ice Cream Cake**—Two cups of sugar, two cups flour, one cup corn starch, whites of 8 eggs, one small cup butter, one cup sweet milk, three teaspoonfuls baking powder. Icing—4 cups sugar, whites of four eggs; boil the sugar in one-half cup water untilropy, then stir in and beat the whites of the eggs; flavor to taste. Bake the cake in lay-

ers and put the icing between and on top.

**Soft Gingerbread**—Two cups New Orleans molasses, one cup brown sugar, one cup shortening, one tablespoonful of ginger. Put all in an earthen mixing dish, set on the stove and let it come to a boil, then add one cup of boiling water with one heaping teaspoonful soda in it. Let the mixture cool, then stir in five cups of flour. Bake in shallow tins and cut in squares.

**Sponge Cake**—Beat six eggs two minutes; add two and two-thirds cups of sugar, and beat five minutes; add two cups of flour with two teaspoonfuls of cream of tartar, and beat two minutes; dissolve one teaspoonful soda in one cup of sweet milk, add, with one cup of flour, a little salt, and one teaspoonful lemon extract; bake in deep tins.

**Fruit Cake**—Three eggs well beaten, one and one-half cup of sugar, one cup of rich sour cream, one teaspoonful ground cinnamon and cloves, (one part cloves to two parts cinnamon) and a pinch of salt. After all is well stirred together, add two level teaspoonfuls soda, 2 cupfuls sifted flour, and one pound raisins that have been stoned and chopped a little. Bake in a moderate oven.

**Coconut Jumbles**—1 cup butter, two cups sugar, two eggs, half a grated coconut or about a coffee-cupful of coconut; make just stiff enough to roll out thin, and bake.

**Oatmeal Cookies**—One cup of oatmeal soaked in two cups of milk, two cups of sugar, two-thirds of a cup of butter, one-half a teaspoonful each of salt and soda, flour to make a dough; roll thin, cut out and bake quickly.

**Ginger Snaps**—Two cups of molasses, one cup of lard, one tablespoonful of ginger, one teaspoonful of salt, two of soda. Let the ingredients boil up once, then add it up until stiff enough to roll out, and bake in a quick oven.

**Light Rolls**—To one and one-half pints of milk add one tablespoonful sugar, two tablespoons lard, two tablespoons yeast, two quarts flour. Make them up about five hours, then roll them out like biscuits, butter one side and fold them once.

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
