WHY KIDS GO WRONG

The chief engineer of the Cincinnati park department, in a recent address, shows the effect of playgrounds on conduct of children. In the wards of his city where playgrounds are fewest, there the peak of delinquency is the highest. In one neighborhood delinquency was reduced 87 per cent just by opening a playground. COUNTY AGENT NOTES

Another carload of war salvage blasting powder was ordered this past week. This brings the total ordered in Washington County since November 1st to 270,000 pounds.

Orders placed now will be filled in about 60 to 70 days according to the latest information received. It is thought that no more car lot pools will be ordered until early fall as the demand for powder is light at this time of the year.

FORD NEWS

First payment of interest on Investment Certificates of the Detroit, Toledo & Ironton, the Ford railroad, has been computed on a basis of twelve per cent annual return. Checks for interest payment covering the months of November and December, 1923, have been mailed to all employees of the road holding certificates, payments hereafter to be made January 1 and July 1.

When the D. T. & I. employees savings plan was approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission, no guaranteed rate of interest could be specified. This was to depend upon the railroad's financial condition and its earnings.

Accordingly, it was decided that the company's income has been sufficient since the inauguration of the plan last November to justify a computation of twelve per cent annually.

The first payment of this high rate of interest has had the effect of producing such enthusiasm for the plan among the road's employees and there has been considerable of an increase in the number of certificate purchasers.

Within a month after the plan was announced, 147 employees had deposited \$6,233.80. By February 1 of this year certificate holders increased in number to 585 with a total of \$55,060.02 invested.

The D. T. & I. is issuing \$1,000,000 worth of the certificates and men on the company

pay roll may invest up to one-third of their salary.

A desirable feature not found in the average investment is that if for any reason it becomes necessary for an employee to leave a position or all of his income, he can do so without delay or inconvenience.
