RATE CUTS HIGH

Reductions of railway rates that have been made since the large advance of rates was granted by the Interstate Commerce Commission in 1920, are shown in an editorial in the current issue of the Railway Age to amount to \$1,875,000 per day, or \$63,000,000 annually.

"In addition," says the Railway Age, "the taxes of the railways have been increased about \$200,000 a day, which makes the total reduction in the amount of revenues the railways are being allowed to collect from the public and keep to carry on their business about \$2,075,000 a day or more than one-half of the total advance in rates granted in 1920."

The presentation of these facts was called forth by the introduction in Congress by Representative Huddleston of Alabama, to prohibit the railways from charging any rate higher than was charged for the same service on August 25, 1920, pointing out that Representative Huddleston is the principal spokesman of the Railway Labor Leaders in the House, the Railway Age observes that his bill would "more quickly and certainly reduce all the railways to bankruptcy than any other bill that has been introduced."

"The total reduction of the freight and passenger rates since the advances were made in 1920, stated in terms of revenues, exceeds \$683,000,000 annually," says the Age. "This means that 17 per cent, or almost one-half, of the total advance both in passenger and freight rates granted in 1920 already has been taken away."

This advance was granted because the Interstate Commerce Commission found that the railroads had to receive higher rates to enable them to provide efficient service.

"The adoption of Representative Huddleston's bill, putting the rates back to where they were in the first eight months of 1920 would take \$776,000,000 more of their annual earnings away from the railroads. Every railway in the country, large and small, would be bankrupted."

NEAR EAST RELIEF ANNUAL REPORT

Sixty Thousand Children Trained; Thousands Encouraged to "Carry On."

How America rescued 250,000 people from certain death, saved 16,000 orphans from blindness, restored 14,353 orphans to home life and self support, gave medical aid to 22,000 people although twelve physicians died while fighting typhus, clothed 605,300 refugees, accomplishing these results in spite of obstacles that would have daunted anyone except an Anglo Saxon, is told in the annual report of Near East Relief which has recently been filed with Congress.

Moving 20,000 children a distance of hundreds of miles until practically all the Armenian children are out of Turkey; feeding, clothing, housing, and training 60,000 children, adjusting boys and girls at the age of 16 to make their own way as mechanics for railway shops, instructors in nursing, school teachers, skilled artisans and farmers, giving faith, hope, and courage and the will to fight back to support to thousands of people—all these are but a few of the achievements in the Near East last year.

A fund of nearly \$3,000,000 was raised and expended at an overhead cost of \$675,000.

These and other facts are found in the annual report, copies of which may be secured on application to the Near East Relief, J. J. Handsaker, State Director, 613 Stock Exchange, Portland.

"The achievements, great as they are, give us no sense of pride," states Handsaker, "only a sense of gratitude that we have been able to do as much as we have and of regret that we could not do more. Last year at one time our Near East Relief workers were surrounded by dying men, women and children at five relief stations at once. A heart broken relief worker took down the orphanage sign from his overcrowded orphanage because there was no further room and children continued to come pleading for admission."

"Admission to orphanages was refused to 5000 children at one time. Due to lack of funds it was found necessary to discontinue child feeding in Constantinople although there were six inches of snow on the ground at the time."

At the present date there are at least 500,000 people homeless in Greece, people who two years ago were self supporting and self respecting residents of Turkey. A third of a million people are slowly starving to death although the people aided by the Greek government to the extent of its ability and by relief agencies are attempting to fight their way back through unspeakable discouragements to self support.

The report closes with urgent recommendations from 15 prominent Americans recently in the Near East that the work be continued until the children now in the orphanages are brought to self support and that the needs of the hundreds of thousands of other helpless children in the Near East be urged upon America. Among those signing these recommendations are John H. Finley, editor of the New York Times, Ex-Governor Allen of Kansas, Dr. Cavert, Secretary Federal Council of Churches, Bishop Cannon, M. E. Church South, Mrs. Alice Hogan Rice.

EX-GOVERNOR ALLEN PRAISES OREGONIANS

Declares No Finer Workers Anywhere Than O. A. C. Graduates.

"America hasn't done anything finer in her history than the constructive work she is now doing in Armenia, Greece, Palestine and Syria," states ex-Governor Allen, of Kansas. "Recently I was in the Near East, saw the work and the splendid group of workers and I am glad to say there are no finer workers anywhere than those relief workers, and Leonard Harthill and Ethel Long Newman, of the Oregon Agricultural College, are two of the best among them."

"At Alexandropol, I met Harthill, who is in charge of a great agricultural work. He is teaching in an ancient land modern agriculture and modern stock breeding. Working almost without material, he is creating an institution which will be to that country what institutions like O. A. C. are to Oregon. By modern methods he has doubled the productivity of the soil and already his graduates are being sought by the Government. One of the best things he has done is to fight successfully the Russian plague."

"I also met Ethel Long Newman, formerly of Oregon, who together with her husband, is doing a splendid work in the Caucasus. Their ranch is to become in time a school under the direction of the government. At present it is a part of the very great work that Harthill and the Newmans are carrying on for the Near East Relief."

Concerning this school, Mrs. Newman writes: "We shall have a small school, emphasizing agriculture, of course, and correlated it with practical care, breeding and feeding of stock, milk production, dairying, general gardening, forage crops, etc. We shall have not more than fifty girls, whom I expect to give training in home-making—not forgetting that the Armenian wife is at once the housekeeper, dairy maid and general farm hand. I am afraid with my western ideas that I shall be a little loath to have them qualify for the latter job! But knowing that to be married is their chief aim, perhaps I had better have them known as particularly good harvest hands!"

"The emergency is not past," concludes Allen. "Children are dying every day in the Near East for lack of nourishment. I have borrowed money to contribute to the Near East Relief work. I wish I had more to give than I have. I am not a crank upon the subject, but I have picked it out as one of the most deserving of efforts because it deals mainly with childhood life. The correction of the situation over there must begin with the generations that are now coming on."

Directions for Washing Curtains or Collars Given by Department of Agriculture.

Certain articles in the wardrobe and household require special cleaning if their use is to be properly prolonged. Among these come lace. The United States Department of Agriculture gives the following directions for washing it:

Measure before washing it, as in the case of curtains or collars. It is important to keep the original size and shape. Very delicate lace should be basted carefully on a piece of cotton cloth and washed on that to prevent straining the lace. Wash in lukewarm water and soap suds, squeezing rather than rubbing out the dirt. Bleach by setting in direct sunshine and keeping moist with soap or borax solution. Rinse thoroughly. Restore a faded cream or ecru color by rinsing in clear coffee or tea and stretching immediately; the color of the liquid as seen through a tumbler held up to the light should be the same as that desired in the lace. In drying, stretch on a padded board and pin into its original shape and size. Net or lace curtains may be pinned to a sheet on the floor or, better, placed on a curtain stretcher adjusted to the desired size.

Lace may sometimes be cleaned by covering it with warm French chalk allowing it to stand overnight and then shaking thoroughly.
