REPORT OF AUDITOR

Hon. Otto Erickson, Mayor, and Members of the Common Council Of the City of Beaverton, Oregon Gentlemen: Pursuant to our agreement I have made an audit of the accounts and records of your City from January 1, 1919, to December 31, 1923 and have prepared various statements and schedules which are made part of this report.

Street Improvements: Beaverton officials are entitled to great credit for the manner in which the assessments were taken care of. As you will note all assessments that were not bonded have been collected. This is a feature that I have not encountered in any of the Cities of Oregon I have audited.

Bond and Bond Interest Fund (Bancroft Act): The statutes pertaining to the keeping of the accounts of the collections of installments and interest on bonded liens unfortunately directs that the collections be carried in a Bond and Interest account. These two items should be carried in separate accounts. In the contract made in the sale of bonds as soon as there is sufficient collections of the face of installments at any interest paying date, a call must be made for outstanding bonds for payment and when the items of collections are in one fund it is impossible for the officers to know absolutely without further computations the amounts on hand with which they can use for this purpose. Of course the interest is on every six month and must be met, but the bond holders expect prompt retirement of their bonds. Your accounts have been kept according to the requirements of the statutes and the interest promptly paid.

The standing of the Bonded assessments liens with the bond issues are as follows:
Unpaid Bonded liens, \$10,582.02.
Bond issue no. 1; improvements no. 1, 2 and three. Bonds outstanding, \$11,000.00.
Unpaid Bonded liens; bond issue no. 2; Improvements no. 4, 5 and 6; Bonds outstanding, \$16,000.00.

Unpaid Bonded liens; Bond issue no. 3; Improvement no. 7; Bonds outstanding \$20,568.27.
No collections have been made on sale of Bonded liens on improvement no. 8, amounting to \$12,858.57 on December 31, 1923 as the installments were not due.

General Obligation Bonds, issue of \$12,300.00; General Obligation Bonds, issue of \$1,500.00; Total \$13,800.00.

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THE LIGHTNING CAKE

HOW TO MAKE THE LIGHTNING CAKE

(Use level measurements for all materials)

- 1/2 cup milk
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup Amaizo
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 2 cups flour
