A FEW DAYS WITH THE MOVIES

There was a happy company of ten that left the studio on a location trip for the Mt. Hood country, their destination being Homestead Inn and Lost Lake. I was asked to join the company by Mr. Al Ferguson, director and star actor of F. C. F. Film Corporation and I enjoyed every minute of it.

First I want to say that because you fill some small part of a screen play, don't think you are a movie actor. Almost here is the term used for the part you fill. It takes facial expression, ability to act and

feel the part. That is why you find so many stars of the speaking stage good on the screen.

The locations that were selected for scenic wonders and beauty one would have to view them, because description is difficult of appreciation to depict its grandeur, and I have seen much from Yellowstone, west.

See Oregon first.
Getting back to my topic. Everything was arranged, our location selected, before he left the studio. Two canoes were picked up at Portland for the Lost Lake location. After an all-day ride by auto, we arrived at the Homestead Inn, on our first location. We certainly did fine with the auto. "All stars."

After enjoying a pleasant evening with music and cards, we retired for an early start, make-up and set (a term used for part of an act) or play. A great deal of experience and knowledge of actualities is necessary on the part of the director and camera man, especially a quick eye, for the recording of each expression and move of each and every one in the set, the proper reflection of the projected sunlight, etc., on the action. When you take an action over a few times, it's rather expensive as well as trying on the director. We took advantage of all the sunlight and worked throughout. The next day we were at Lost Lake location, and it was wonderful. I hope all you Oregonians get to see this scenario production. Here on the lake Al Ferguson, playing the lead, does a great act. His canoe is shot full of holes, the bullets splash around him, and from the sinking canoe swims with all his clothes and boots on to shore. There's no hokum about this act. It's thrilling. Miss Pauline Carley enacted many pretty parts on the lake and shore. She's just the type for the sweet motherless daughter she plays. Frank Clarke I cannot speak too highly of as an old miner. His style reminds me of D. Thompson in "The Old Homestead," a stage play. Leo Bates, a burly villain of the Western country looks and acts his part. You feel hate toward the villain.

I like the outdoor and nature scenes. The studio parts seem artificial, the strong light dazzles your eyes and more or less things make you feel conscious you are acting. This applies more to the amateur or atmosphere. So don't forget to be a real actor in movieland. It takes facial expression and acting, depicting the play, a thing usually implied by words. Actors off the screen are just like other folks and enjoy their work.
