Union High School

Proposed

Business Men Will Back Movement to Rent High School to Proposed Union High School.

The school board invited the business men of Beaverton to meet in the office of Covell & Co., Tuesday evening of this week. The purpose of the meeting was to get the sentiment of those actively engaged in business in regard to the disposition of the present high school building in case that there is a favorable vote on the proposed organization of a union high school.

It was the consensus of opinion of all those present that the board under the circumstances would be justified in renting the present high school building to the union high school for the sum of one dollar per year. It was pointed out that there was outstanding indebtedness on this building, and the law provides that under these circumstances where the building is turned over to the union high school the union high school would have to assume the indebtedness.

The bonds that are outstanding on the high school are a debt created by the district of Beaverton and the board did not feel it would be just to the other districts to ask them to assume this debt. Therefore it was suggested that instead of being deeded the high school be rented to the union district at the sum of one dollar per year.

Another meeting will be held Friday, August 15, in the high school auditorium to which all residents of the territory embraced in the proposed union high school will be invited. Speakers will be present to explain the different elements of union high school organization and to answer such questions as may arise or be brought before the meeting.
