## Household Dept.

### VALUABLE HOUSEHOLD

### RECIPES AND SUGGESTIONS

**Pleasant Fritter Batter**—1 cup of flour, two teaspoonsfuls baking powder, one egg, one-half cup of milk, one-fourth teaspoon of salt, and two tablespoons sugar if sweet fritters are desired. Sift dry ingredients together, add beaten egg and milk and beat until smooth. To this batter add corn for corn fritters, and drop from a spoon into deep, hot fat.

Peel, quarter and core apples, dip each quarter into the batter, then fry in the deep, hot fat, and you have apple fritters.

**A Delicious Icing**—Put 1 cup sugar in skillet, let melt, then add one cup pure cream. Boil until smooth and you have a fine icing or glaze.

**Potato Pastry**—Sift together one cup of baking powder and rub in one-fourth cup of lard. Add two cups of mashed potatoes and make a stiff paste with cold water. Roll out one-fourth inch thick and use as ordinary pastry.

**Ham and Eggs**—Slice ham as thin as possible and place in a pan in the oven. As it fries it will cup. When it has all cupped and fried enough break an egg on each slice and return to the oven, until the egg is cooked.

**Salad Dressing**—1 tablespoon flour, one egg, one tablespoon sugar, one-half teaspoon mustard, one-half cup vinegar, one cup boiling water, butter size of walnut, salt to season. Mix fine, then add egg, and beat well. Add vinegar, and boiling water. Cook in double boiler till it thickens. Cucumber and hard boiled egg may be added if liked.

**Veal Casserole**—Prepare chops or steak like round beefsteak. Bake with a cup of sweet corn and a pint of sliced potatoes. Garnish with a grated hard-boiled egg and parsley and take it to the table without the lid.

**Lemon Meringue Filling for Cake**—One egg or two egg yolks, the grated rind and juice of one lemon, two tablespoons water, one cup sugar, two tablespoons butter. Cook the sugar, lemon juice, water and butter in a double boiler until the sugar is dissolved, then pour it upon the well beaten eggs. Beat well, return to the boiler and cook until thick. If a less rich filling is wanted a little white may be combined with the above to dilute it.

This filling, undiluted, keeps well if sealed, and may therefore be made for future use when butter and eggs are low in price. Diluted with a little hot water, it makes a good lemon sauce for plain puddings.
