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COUNTY AGENT NOTES

Announcement has just been received that Pyrotol, a war salvage powder replacing Sodolol, can now be ordered, and information is given that shipments will be made starting the latter part of September and the first of October. Pyrotol is said to be equal to 20 per cent stumping powder and is packed in 50 pound boxes with about 150 sticks to the box. The cost will be \$7.80 for 100 pounds, or two boxes, f. o. b. Hillsboro.

Orders in Washington County may be placed with the county agricultural agent. The powder must be paid for when ordered as money must accompany order which goes to the Bureau of Public Roads.

A report from the crop specialist at O. A. C. shows that the following have grain passing the final inspection for certification: James Sewell, Hillsboro, R. 1, 3 acres Gray Winter Oats; W. N. Hathorn, Laurel, White Winter Wheat; James White Winter Wheat; E. L. Kraus, Cornelius, R. 2, Senator Oats; H. T. Hesse, Hillsboro, R. 2, Foise, or Red Chaff wheat.

There are several inspections to be reported later.
