WEEKLY MENU SUGGESTIONS

SUNDAY—Breakfast: Plums, but-
tered toast, eggs. Dinner: Chicken
cooked in milk. Supper: Cup chicken
with caramel sauce.

MONDAY—Breakfast: Corn, muf-
fins, coffee. Dinner: New England
boiled dinner, apple dumplings. Sup-
per: Whole wheat nut bread.

TUESDAY—Breakfast: Pears, oat-
meal and milk. Dinner: Boiled din-
ner, hash, meat loaf, tomato sauce.
Supper: Milk toast with grated cheese,
tea.

WEDNESDAY—Breakfast: Peaches,
bran flakes. Dinner: Veal cutlets, apple
and celery salad. Supper: Potato
salad.

THURSDAY—Breakfast: Poached
eggs on toast, coffee. Dinner: Baked
ham, rice, potatoes, buttered beets.
Supper: Lemon jelly, sugar cookies.

FRIDAY—Breakfast: Eggs cooked
in shell, buttered toast. Dinner: Fish
chowder, apple pie with cheese. Sup-
per: Spaghetti with tomato.

SATURDAY—Breakfast: Scrambled
eggs, graham gems, coffee. Dinner:
Meat pie, cherry pudding. Supper:
Chocolate cake, tea.

Chicken Baked in Milk.
Cut up a good fat chicken after
scrubbing well with soda water. Wipe
dry and roll in seasoned flour, brown
in butter, then cover with sweet milk
and bake for several hours in a mod-
erate oven. The milk with the flour
will form a gravy. Serve with mashed
potatoes.

Potato Salad.
Cook the potatoes in their jackets.
When done remove the skins, cut in
cubes, small enough to thoroughly sear.
Marinate with three tablespoon-
fuls of oil and one of vinegar. Let
stand for an hour or more. When pre-
paring the potatoes add a minced
onion, and one good-sized cucumber
with a cupful of minced celery. Look-
ing the celery, dust with celery salt.
Take three tablespoonfuls of a highly
seasoned salad dressing, add one cupful
of whipped cream and mix with the
salad, adding salt and cayenne
as needed. The secret of a good po-
tato salad is allowing the potato to
stand long enough with the season-
ings to become seasoned through.

Household Dept. VALUABLE HOUSEHOLD RECIPES AND SUGGESTIONS

Apple Butter—Pare, core and
slice the desired quantity of
apples. Boil in sweet cider until
it is reduced one-half. While
the cider is boiling add the ap-
ples. Cook slowly, stirring con-
stantly. When it begins to
thicken add one cup of brown
sugar to each two quarts of
the butter. Boil until it remains
in a smooth mass, when a little
is cooled. About a bushel of
apples to a gallon of boiled
cider will be found to be the
right proportion.

Apple Peanut Butter—Cut two
cups of apples fine. Add one
cup of celery cut fine. Make a
dressing of peanut butter by
mixing six tablespoonfuls of
lemon juice to one tablespoo-
nful of peanut butter. Mix this
through the apples and celery.
Add salt and pepper, chill and
serve on lettuce garnished with
salted peanuts.

Apples With Orange Sauce—
Core six red apples, but do not
peel. Cook in boiling water till
tender. Remove the skins and
scrape off all pulp adhering to
the inside and add to the apple.
Reduce the water to one cupful.
Add one cupful of sugar and
the juice of an orange. Cook
until thick and like syrup and
pour over the apples. Drop a
spoonful of whipped cream on
each.

Apple Roses—Wipe clean six
nice red apples and core them.
Chop nuts and raisins to fill
the openings. Season with a
little vanilla. Cut the skin in
eighths about an inch down,
and turn each point down as you
steam the fruit slowly. Serve
with roast pork.

Crystallized Apples—Two cup-
fuls sugar, one and one-half
cupfuls water, one-half lemon
sliced thin, five apples peeled
and cored. Boil sugar and wa-
ter fifteen minutes. Into this
boiling syrup drop, at the end
of fifteen minutes, the apples.
Cook about ten minutes. When
syrup has become cold pour it
over the apples, using the lem-
on slices as a garnish. Serve
with whipped cream.

Apple Punch—Eight cups of
cold water, seven large apples,
which have been cored, quar-
tered, but not pared. Add to
this a cup of raisins, a little
cinnamon, the grated rind and
the juice of three lemons. Ar-
ter this is boiled add eight cups
more of water. Boil three-quar-
ters of an hour and then drain.
Add two pounds of sugar and
the juice of two lemons. Stir
until dissolved. Add some seed-
ed and skinned raisins, and
serve in punch cups.

Apple Sherbet—Take the juice
from a quart of apples which
have been boiled in a pint of
water until tender and press
through a sieve. When it is
cold add the juice of an orange,
a lemon and a quarter pound
of sugar and a quart of water.
Beat well and freeze. While
yet soft, add the whites of an
egg well beaten, and finish the
freezing.

Apple Ginger—Peel and chop
two and one-half pounds of sour

apples. Put in a stew pan and
add one and one-half pounds
of light brown sugar, juice and
rind of one and one-half lemons,
one-half ounce of ginger,
a few grains of salt and water
enough to prevent the apples
burning. Cover and cook
slowly for four hours, adding
water as necessary. Apple gin-
ger will keep for several weeks.

Apple Conserve—Make a syrup
of two cups of sugar to one-
half cup water. Pare and cut
into eighths sound apples. Boil
sugar and water until a rich
syrup is formed, then add the
apples and simmer until clear.
Take up carefully, lay on plates
and let dry in the sun twelve
hours. Roll in sugar. Treat in
this manner for three or four
days, then pack in glass jars.
