OVER THE RADIO**
An agricultural and educational
radio service will be broadcast by
the G. A. C. Extension Service
from the Portland Oregonian
station every Tuesday evening
at 8 o'clock. Further notice.
Two fifteen-minute lectures on
general farm, truck and backlot
garden and general educational
subjects, by extension, experi-
mental station and college speci-
alists, will constitute each pro-
gram.
"College by radio has passed
the fad stage and is now recog-
nized by the extension service

as a modern utility," says the
announcement. "Inquiries of
1500 listeners by the Oregonian
showed that more than 25 per
cent of them are interested in
agricultural lectures, and 196
radio owners out of 200 in rural
districts, want the agricultural

Grant Never Said Much,
But He Stuck to His Job

Performances Are Better Than Promises—
