VALUABLE HOUSEHOLD
RECIPES AND SUGGESTIONS

Celery Soup—Wash 3 or 4
stalks of celery, cut in short
lengths and cook in 2 and 1/2 cups
half of boiling salted water
until soft. Press through a
sieve. Scald two and one-half
cups milk with one slice onion,
remove onion and add scalded
milk to celery pulp. Cream 3
tablespoons butter with one-
fourth cup flour and one half
teaspoon paprika. Dilute with
a little of the hot liquid. When
smooth and creamy combine with
the remaining hot liquid. Cook
15 or 20 minutes, stirring con-
stantly to prevent lumping.
Serve with croutons, toasted
crackers or toast strips.

Cream of Tomato Soup—Scald
four cups (one quart) milk with
one slice onion. Remove onion.
Dilute one fourth cup flour with
3 or 4 tablespoons cold water.
Combine the diluted flour with
the scalded milk and cook about
5 minutes, stirring constantly
until smooth and creamy. Cook
one half can tomatoes with two
teaspoons sugar and one half
teaspoon paprika. Rub through
sieve, add one fourth teaspoon
soda and combine with the
thickened milk. Strain the mix-
ture into a hot soup dish con-
taining one fourth cup butter.
Season with salt and pepper.

Onion Soup—Melt one half
cup butter or butter substitute
and in it cook one third cup
diced carrot, one stalk sliced
celery, one teaspoon parsley, one
cup sliced onion and one tea-
spoon paprika. When the veg-
etables are soft and yellow add
one tablespoon flour and blend
well. Then add one and one
half cups white stock and cook
for fifteen minutes, stirring al-
most constantly. Scald one cup
rich milk or cream into which
has been stirred one egg yolk
and add to the hot soup, stirring
to prevent the jumping of the
egg. Strain and serve with
crackers.

Cream of Celery Soup—Two
cups of white stock, two cups
celery, cut in inch pieces, two
cups boiling water, one slice
of onion, two tablespoons
butter, two tablespoons flour,
two cups milk, one cupful
cream, pinch of salt and pepper.
Parboil the celery in water for
ten minutes, drain, and add the
stock. Cook until the celery is
soft and rub through a sieve.
Scald the onion in milk, remove
onion, add milk to stock, add
cream and season with salt and
pepper.

Fruit Salad—Six bananas, 3
oranges, juice of one lemon, a
few nut meats or black cap
raspberries, one half cup of

shredded coconut, one cup of
sugar, and a box of Jello. Peel
and slice bananas crosswise into
pieces one fourth inch thick.
Remove seeds, rind and white
skin from the oranges and cut
into small bits. Toss all light-
ly together and pour the dis-
solved Jello over it according
to directions on package. Set
in a cool place to thicken and
serve cold.

Codfish Chowder—One cupful
codfish, two thick slices bacon,
two onions, two potatoes, one
tablespoonful parsley, a pinch
of celery seed, salt, pepper, and

milk. Dice and fry the bacon.
Add the onions, slightly brown-
ed, the potatoes and boil
until tender. Add bacon and
onions to the potatoes and the
water in which the potatoes
were cooked. Wash the codfish
and pick or cut it into small
pieces and add to the broth. If
the codfish is very salty, it
should be scalded first. Add
three cupfuls of water and con-
densed milk in the proportions
called for on the can of milk.
Stir in the parsley, butter and
celery seed. Put on the stove
and simmer twenty minutes be-
fore serving.
